PORT ARTHUR FAILED TO LIFT STANLEY CUP

Challengers Stronger Than Anticipated—Ottawa Won 13 to 4 in Very Interesting Game.

Ottawa, Ont., Mar. 16.—In one of the prettiest exhibitions of the season, the champion Ottawa hockey team tonight successfully defended the far-famed Stanley Cup for the second time this week, Port Arthur, champions of the New Ontario league, losing by a score of 13 goals to 4. The Ottawa's had the game safely tucked away after the first period, but there was not any slowing up on the part of either team, with the result that the game was very interesting, if not exciting from beginning to end. The visitors, despite the large score run up against them, proved much stronger than anticipated and it is only to them to say that the Ottawa margin does not represent the play.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
