ARCLIGHT, FAMOUS OLD HORSE IN MEMORABLE RACES HERE

Beaten on Fredericton Track in 1897 by Katrina and Minota—Got Mark of 2.24 3-4 Here in 1893—One of Greatest Rampart Trotters in Maritime Provinces.

(Acadian Recorder.)
The death is announced at Truro of Arclight, who was sired by Prince in 2:22½, 2:21½, 2:23, 2:21½, 2:22½. Paul T. capturing the first two heats. HIS LATER DAYS.

In 1900 he was purchased by J. A. He was afterwards sold to A. H. Learmont for John Fraser, Truro, who used him for a driving horse, and well cared for him in his old days. He retained his speed almost to the last, and his death, to use a common expression, was due to heart failure.

Arclight was another of the get of the Rampart, who was about the first of standard bred stallions to be imported to this province. He was brought here by C. R. Bill, Billtown, N.B., and notwithstanding that he did not have the class of mares to breed to as stallions in the United States, he stands well up among the sons of Almost as a producer of speed.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
