D. U. R. CONS BONDS

Asked for an opinion on Detroit United 4½ per cent. Consolidated bonds, Financial America says:

"It would appear that the present status of the Detroit United Railway Co's affairs presents many perplexing elements. It is well known that the company is now earning considerably more than its fixed charges—over twice the amount required for such purposes. In view of the fact that the management intends to issue a large amount of new bonds and is operating at a much less amount of remuneration per passenger, it is an absorbing question as to just how future results will work out. It is, we understand proposed to build a number of extensions etc., and whether or not these new lines will prove productive of sufficient revenue to offset the increase in charges, together with the smaller fare received, is a question we are not in a position to answer or even predict regarding its outcome. Prominent bond dealers in this city however, intimate that they are not apprehensive with regard to the future for bondholders of the company."

COBALT GAME IN LONDON

London, Nov. 4.—Dealers in Rhodesians have had something of a shock, and the market a bad advertisement. One day last week they discovered that a company, whose shares have been a favorite speculative counter and have been widely placed among small investors have issued about three-quarters of a million shares in excess of the number given as "authorized" in the last report of the directors.

This came to light through an application for a special settlement in a further issue of shares, and the discovery led to investigations being made which resulted in further disclosures of an interesting character. The company is the Amalgamated Properties of Rhodesia, shares in which have been bought by people on the continent as well as in numerous places in the British Isles.

At one time last year the shares which are of the nominal value of 5s each, soared to 13s 6d but of late they have been dropping. The many holders who have been wondering why the price has gradually dwindled to 5s, need wonder no longer now.

DEER AND MOOSE ARE BEING EXTERMINATED IN MAINE

Dover, Me., Nov. 5.—That Maine must make some radical changes in her game laws to save the deer and moose from total extermination is the belief of many of the men in this section of the state who are interested in keeping Maine in the front ranks of big game states.

The matter is being discussed freely this year owing to the fact that deer are by no means as plentiful as usual, as is shown by the record kept by the state game wardens through whose hands must go all game shipped by express. The falling off in deer is a surprise to some, but many of the guides and wardens express no wonder, stating that they have seen for several years that the deer are being exterminated and are growing scarcer year by year.

"Unless the law-makers do something in the near future Maine's deer and moose will go the way of the caribou that were once plentiful in this state," says a sportsman. "I know from personal observation that the deer are decreasing year by year, and unless the legislature makes radical changes in the law it will take many years to bring the deer back to Maine in goodly numbers."

Hon. John F. Sprague of this town president of the Maine Sportsmen's Fish and Game Association, is convinced that big game is thinning out rapidly, and it is likely that the Association will recommend some radical changes.

Some of those who have an interest in keeping game plentiful in Maine favor a law protecting the doe deer from slaughter. They suggest that the legislature declare close time on does for a period of three or four

years, and also possibly limit the hunters to one buck.

Moose, say the game wardens, are also getting fewer in number, and they call attention to the fact that there are about four cow moose to every bull. They claim that many of the cows produce no calves, and it is suggested that the law be changed to protect the bulls and allow a period of open time on cows. Others prefer a close time for five years on all moose.

Men who have studied game conditions for many years in Piscataquis County, say that in some localities where game was plentiful, five years ago not a deer can be found. One well-known trapper tells of a certain section of burned country where recently sixteen cow moose were seen in four days and only three bulls in the same length of time.

RECLAIMING SWAMP LANDS

Elizabeth City, N. C., Nov. 7.—Reports of gratifying progress in the reclamation of swamp and overflowed lands in this section were presented at the fourth annual convention here today of the North Carolina Drainage Association. The convention will conclude its business tomorrow.

Montreal, Nov. 4.—After a protracted debate at last night's meeting of the Montreal Trades and Labor Council, Delegate A. Masse, of Victoria Lodge, International Association of Machinists, was expelled for five years, on a charge of having violated the constitution and disregarded the orders of the Trades and Labor Council in accepting the nomination of the Liberal Conservative party in St. Mary's division in the general election. The fight was one of the warmest in the history of the organization, but when the vote was finally taken the majority of those present voted against Mr. Masse.

Delegate Masse has been active in labor circles for many years. He is a past president of the Montreal Trades and Labor Council and represented the organization at the Winnipeg convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.
