WOULD BE INTERESTING

Mr. Seigny, M. P., for Dorchester who is to second the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne when Parliament assembles, has made speeches before now that were considered worth reporting and preserving. Thus the Canadian Annual Review for 1910 has a record of a speech delivered by Mr. Seigny at Tingwick, in Drummond and Arthabaska, on Oct. 31, 1910, in which he said:

"The Navy Bill is an attempt by Ontario and the Provinces of the West to scotch Quebec and enslave our people forever. What has England ever done for you? She has no need of your help. She is strong enough to defend herself. You must protest against helping England in her wars; unless you do, conscription will come next."

On the following day at Arthabaska Mr. Seigny asked some very audacious questions. On that occasion he exclaimed:

"The Navy belongs to His Majesty. Is that a Canadian Navy? Who is His Majesty? Have we any Majesty here? The Navy is wanted by the Lord of England who will not pay taxation there and are striving to get it out of the Colonies."

If Mr. Seigny wants to make a real stir in Parliament next week let him, as an exchange suggests, treat his hearers to some of this campaign oratory warmed over. Probably, however he will permit himself to be intimidated by the baleful eye of the Minister of Militia gleaming from the Treasury benches. The House of Commons, in that event, will be deemed by him unworthy of listening to oratory of the kind that entranced the habitants of Drummond and Arthabaska a year ago.

Hon. F. D. Monk, in a recent speech said that Mr. Borden allowed him to select his own colleagues from Quebec. The following statement in a recent speech by Mr. Amand Lavigne one of the Nationalist leaders should be interesting to York County Toryism:

"I know that Mr. Pelletier will carry out his promise about the referendum, but I am in a position to say more—I assure you that you shall have this referendum. While Mr. Borden was forming his cabinet I went to Ottawa to see him and I said to him: 'Here is the Province of Quebec, regenerated, do you want her?' Mr. Borden tendered me a loyal hand, and I can assure you that he is not the fanatic that was called in Quebec."

Mr. Andy Humble, a leading Stanley Tory, sent a telegram of congratulation to Hon. Mr. Hazen upon the occasion of his appointment as minister of marine. In fact, he was the only man from "the body of the country" to take this course, and already his name is mentioned in connection with a fat government job. It is not too late yet for other Tory office seekers to write or wire their congratulations to the minister. Hon. Mr. Hazen will stand for more flattery than the ordinary man, and then you know, boys, he will have a lot of jobs to hand out before long.

Montreal Herald:—The Liberals took their kicking in good spirit, but the victors are not showing up any too well. Not one of the speakers at the Fleming banquet, not even our Mr. Crockett who owes him so much, deemed it worth while to hand out a bouquet to Hon. Mr. McLeod on his promotion from the office of solicitor general to that of Provincial Secretary. Can it be that Hon. Mr. McLeod is looked upon as a sort of political crackman who forced his way into the government and forced the new premier to promote him? As one of the fighting men of the administration the new provincial secretary should at least be taken seriously by his colleagues.

Premier Fleming, in his speech at Woodstock, announced that he intended to run his government regardless of federal political lines. Hon. Mr. Fleming's predecessor in office made a similar announcement prior to the last local election, and succeeded in catching a number of Liberal votes. He kept his promise by dismissing Liberals from office and handing over their jobs to Tory partisans. The new premier may find greenbacks very useful at election times, but he should not attempt to hand out gold bricks at this stage of the game.

Tory papers are praising the Borden government because the revenue of Canada showed an increase. Horror of horrors! When Mr. O. S. Crockett was in opposition he was constantly condemning the old government by voice and pen for increasing the taxation of the people. He used to figure it out at so much per family and contrast it with the rate which prevailed under the old government. Surely he is not going to stand for this sort of thing from the present administration.

Windsor Record:—The Duke of Connaught has a comfortable income of the royal family he receives \$125,000 a year from the state. By act of Parliament passed in 1871, when he became of age, he was granted \$75,000 yearly, and he was given an additional annual allowance of \$75,000 when he was married in 1879. As Governor General he will draw \$50,000 a year. He has also a private income. The duchess is wealthy in her own right.

A syndicate composed of Mr. O. S. Crockett's law partner and other local Tories has been formed to manufacture a patent nutlock. It is said that they anticipate doing quite a stroke of business with the Department of Railways. With a Tory government in power at Ottawa, it would be more in the interest of the country, if the new device which these gentlemen are boosting, was sold in large numbers to the finance department.

Rev. B. H. Thomas in his sermon to the Orangemen here on Sunday, stated that York was the strongest Orange county this side of Ontario. The Liberals of York will be inclined to the opinion that the rev. gentleman is pretty near right.

Col. A. T. Thompson, ex-M.P., put it very neatly at the Liberal Convention in Toronto the other day when he remarked that while the Liberal Party is no longer led by the Canadian Premier, it is still headed by the premier Canadian.

Sir John Carling, a former minister of agriculture, and now a Canadian senator, is critically ill at his home in London, Ont.

Premier Fleming says that he is going to Ottawa soon and is going to stay, there until the Valley Railway contract is signed. During the recent election Hon. J. D. Hazen, the then premier stated that he was going to remain in local politics until the valley railway question was disposed of. The people of St. John Valley have become accustomed to cheap talk in connection with this railway enterprise and know about how much weight to attach to the premier's statement.

Provincial Secretary McLeod, was "unexpectedly called away" during the progress of the Fleming banquet, and consequently a speech which he had prepared for the occasion was never delivered. Our old friend Mr. Pinder, however, stood by the guns and had his say. It is rather noticeable, however, that he nor in fact none of the other speakers went into to ecstasies over Hon. Mr. McLeod's promotion.

Under the present regime while the members of the city police force do not produce as much revenue as formerly it is noticeable that they dress better and make a smarter appearance than in the old days when chin whiskers were in order. The two officers who walked proudly at the head of the procession on Sunday were much admired.

Mr. Crockett says that he is going to stand up for the rights of the maritime provinces regardless of party. If he keeps his word the chances are that he will frequently be found voting against the Borden government. It is not on record that a Tory government at Ottawa ever did receive much report from Mr. Crockett.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., has declared his intention of standing up for the rights of the Maritime Provinces in future, regardless of party. If he is sincere in this, let him take a firm stand on the naval question, and support a policy which will mean the establishment of mammoth ship yards at St. John and Halifax, and profitable employment for hundreds of our best mechanics.

One would have thought that Hon. J. D. Hazen would have attended the banquet to Premier Fleming at Woodstock, even if by so doing he was put to some little inconvenience. Probably the new minister feels that he already has trouble enough and has no desire to look for more. The soreheads of York were well represented at the banquet.

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KING AND QUEEN
START FOR DURBAR

Surviving brother of the Queen, personal aide de camp to the King and Lieutenant Colonel of the First Life Guards; the Earl of Shaftesbury, Lord Chamberlain to the Queen; the Earl of Chesterfield, Lord Steward of His Majesty's household; the Earl of Shrewsbury, premier Earl of England and a great friend of the King; Lord Stanfordham, private secretary to the King; Lieut. Col. Sir Frederick Ponsonby, equerry and assistant private secretary to the King; Commander Sir Charles Cuet, equerry to the King; Sir Edward Henry, Commissioner of Metropolitan Police, who was recently appointed extra equerry to the King, and Lieut. Col. Sir R. Havelock Charles, Sergeant-Surgeon to the King and principal medical officer on the staff of the King and Queen during the visit to India.

The journey will be broken by two stops, one at Malta and the other at Adam. The ultimate port is Bombay and the arrival there is scheduled for December 2. The day of their Majesties' disembarkation will be one of addresses, processions, receptions and banquets, ending with a grand illumination.

During the entire sea voyage the King will remain in constant communication with London by means of a powerful wireless apparatus installed on the Medina. Everything has been done to insure the safety of the King and the Queen, not only on board of ship, but during their sojourn in India. The great coronation Durbar, which will be held in Delhi December 12, is expected to surpass all previous durbars in magnitude, gorgeousness and attendance, as this is the first time in history that the British rulers will present themselves in person to receive the homage of their people in India. There will be magnificent ceremonies and festivities following the investiture on December 14. Early in January a Court will be held in Calcutta, and by the end of that month the King and Queen are expected back in England again.
