## MONTHLY INCOME OF VICTORIA HOSPITAL EXCEEDED EXPENSES

Trustees Favor Dental Lectures for Pupil-nurses—  
Dr. McGrath Re-elected to Hospital Trustee Board  
—Investigation of Complaint of Undergraduate Nurse

His Worship the Mayor presided at the meeting of the Hospital Trustees held yesterday. President Randolph and Vice-President Barry were both out of the city. Among the other gentlemen present were Warden Rogers, Mr. Sterling, Mr. Whitehead, Mr. McMurray and Secretary Sampson.

The secretary-treasurer, in making a report upon the expenditure for October, was able to present a most satisfactory showing, for the receipts slightly over-balanced the expenditure a condition of things very rarely experienced.

## MATRON'S REPORT.

In the report of the matron, it was shown that forty-four patients were treated during the month, eighteen of these being for surgical treatment. Twenty-five were discharged and three died. Miss Elsie Illingworth, a probationer, has passed examination and upon receipt of the certificate of Dr. Atherton and the matron, she is promoted to the rank of pupil-nurse. Last week the secretary conducted the examination of a young woman for admission to the probationary class, but she failed and was not recommended. Before being received as a probationer the applicant is required to pass an examination equal to that for High School entrance.

Several donations were received in October. Mrs. Hugh Calder sent twice a week to the ward patients a basket containing fruit, flowers, jellies and soups. Mr. McMurray sent books and magazines, and Christchurch Parish Church sent vegetables and fruit, which had been used at the recent harvest festival.

## DR. McGRATH RE-ELECTED.

Dr. Holden, secretary of the medical staff, sent word to the Board that Dr. McGrath had been re-elected to represent the staff on the Trustee Board. This was received with satisfaction as Dr. McGrath takes a lively interest in hospital matters. Dr. Van Wart and Dr. Holden continue to serve the staff as president and secretary respectively.

The secretary of the staff also submitted for approval a schedule of attendance of physicians at the hospital in 1912, which was approved and will later be published with the names of the visiting trustees.

## LECTURE PROGRAM.

The following program of lectures will show the character of the information young women in training receive at Victoria Public Hospital. These lectures began last month and continue through the year as follows:  
Dr. McGrath—Anatomy, Urinology.  
Dr. Holden—Physiology.  
Dr. Mullin—Materia medica, poisons and antidotes.

## LIVELY RUNAWAY ON WATERLOO ROW

A lively runaway took place on Waterloo Row this morning when a coach returning from a funeral was demolished. A telephone pole broken off and a fatal accident by collision with the I. C. R. suburban narrowly averted.

The coach which was driven by William Wilson belonged to the Queen Hotel stables. The horses became frightened at the lower end of Waterloo Row and dashed up that street at a rapid rate of speed and narrowly escaped colliding with several teams en route.

When they reached the foot of University Avenue near the I. C. R. the coach struck a telephone pole and the driver was thrown but escaped without serious injury. The coach however was damaged and the telephone pole broken off thus for a time putting out of commission the telephone service in that locality.

The I. C. R. suburban train was just about to pull out when the horses arrived at the track but he'd back through prompt action on the part of the engine driver.

## LIMITS SUGGESTED

Yesterday afternoon representatives of the Canadian and Dominion Express companies conferred with the mayor and aldermen yesterday with regard to fixing limits for the delivery and taking up of express parcels in this city. The Western limit of Wilmot Park, the first bridge on Waterloo Row, the river front and Victoria street were suggested as the limits by some of the aldermen. Others objected that the matter should be left to the Railway Commission and the express companies. The council took no definite action on the matter.
