BLOOMFIELD  
WILL GIVE BURDEN  
A BIG MAJORITY

Boiestown, March 27.—At Hayesville, Friday night, the school house was packed to its utmost capacity with an enthusiastic crowd who listened attentively to vigorous speeches from Alex. Gibson, Jr., ex-M.P. P., Dr. Moore and N. W. Brown. They were very enthusiastic in their welcome to their former representatives—Sandy Gibson and Dr. Moore, while the ringing hour and a half speech of Mr. Brown was frequently punctuated with applause. Next evening at Parker's Ridge Mr. Brown criticized unmercifully Hazen's Audit Act, their over-drafts, their letting sixty-three bridge jobs out of seventy by days' work, their increase of the public debt, their "school book farce," their increase (?) of stumpage, in which there was \$10,000 of an over-draft, for the collection of the same, because Hazen has increased the salaries of his scalars 2 cents for every 1000 superficial feet they scale. Formerly operators took one-third of their winter's cut off of free hold property, and the balance off of crown land. But, as the 55 years leases expire in five or six years, they are now taking the WHOLE of their cut off of crown lands. This accounts for "the ports showing no increase of export." Then again a very large amount of our sawed lumber goes south in car-load lots; "while all the pulp wood (seven-tenths of what the U.S. uses) passes from our shores duty FREE!"

"The increase from stumpage shows 'AN INCREASED CUT.' They are ruining the public domain! There will be nothing left for the future. But what are they doing with their increased revenue? Look at the Auditor's report. In almost every job for every dollar that goes to the repair or building of a bridge, TWO dollars goes into the pockets of their political heifers. The medical doctor's agricultural policy, in which year before last, they spent the whole of \$200, on cheese and butter factories, and last year the enormous amount of \$100! They have allowed these industries, that the old government tumbled, to waste; so that last year at the last Dominion Exhibition in St. John, New Brunswick had on exhibit a half cheese. While the little province of P. E. I. had thirty-nine cheese. Quebec took first prize on butter, Nova Scotia second and N. B. THIRD! In proportion to their revenue, they are giving just a shade over half to agriculture and education, that the old government gave. ## AT PARKER'S RIDGE

Mr. Calhoun referred, in very kindly terms, to the time when they were building their church here and wanted 3,000 bricks for the foundation. He wrote Mr. Alex. Gibson for the cheapest rate at which he could supply them. When the answer came it read: "Shipped to Boiestown 3,000 brick—a present for your church—freight prepaid!" This was followed by loud applause. Mr. Gibson feelingly replied.

A hearty vote of thanks was moved to ex-Warden Hinchey, who occupied the chair, and the meeting closed with the National Anthem and three cheers for Burden.

An incident of Parker's Ridge meeting was when, among a number of bridges, Mr. Brown read from the Auditor's report the cost of repairs on the Stewart Brook bridge as follows:—R. A. Logan, supt., \$69.55; G. E. Logan, foreman, \$38.25; pay list, \$92.76; C. W. Pond, lumber, \$68.60; G. Henry, bolts, \$17.61; R. Chestnut & Sons, rent jack screws, \$4.25; E. Sanson, lumber, \$2.00; B. Tibbideau, lumber, \$23.55; total, \$316.47. Coun. C. W. Pond rose and explained that he had since received \$7 MORE, making his share \$75.60. This makes the total amount \$323.47 for repairing a little bridge 40 feet long across a brook which, when built, cost \$98.00, lumber and all. Men on both sides of politics here offered to repair the little bridge for \$100. "See where the money goes?" If you want to check this graft, vote for Burden.

Thomas Graham is second and unmarried. He says he can't get married because the girls won't sew for him.

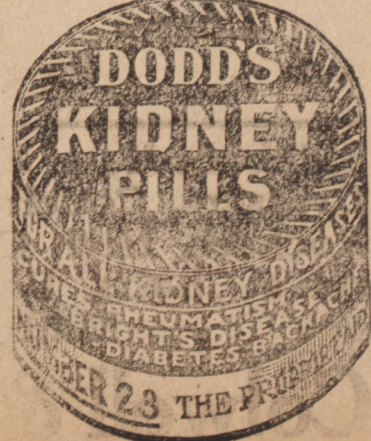

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta if applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
