## DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

## QUEBEC AS SOLID FOR LAURIER AS EVER

St. George, Aug. 16.—Senator Gillmor arrived home yesterday with the delegates to the great convention at St. Stephen. The senator came to St. Stephen on Monday from Montreal.

He says that the outlook in Quebec never was brighter for the Liberals. Leading Conservatives admit that the fight is hopeless. Leaders of the Liberal forces there are confident and say Sir Wilfrid is stronger than ever. The fact that Bourassa is in favor of reciprocity is making the combination of Tory and Nationalist somewhat difficult.

The senator expressed himself as highly pleased with the great Liberal convention at St. Stephen. The fact that the men of Charlotte were willing to leave their occupations now—the busy season with both the farmers and fishermen—was evidence enough to him of the great interest taken in reciprocity.

He believed the electors of Charlotte are thoroughly alive to the great benefits the trade pact will be to the dominion at large, the Maritime Provinces and Charlotte county. He feels confident that the electors will vote for their convictions—that many Conservatives will cast their ballots for reciprocity, and that Charlotte county will be found on election night in the Liberal column with a tremendous majority rolled up for a bigger market and Wm. F. Todd.

## REAR ADMIRAL SCHROEDER RETIRES

Washington, D. C., Aug. 17.—Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder, a conspicuous figure in the navy was placed on the retired list today on account of age. His naval career began in 1868 in which year he graduated from Annapolis and was assigned to duty with the Pacific fleet. During the ensuing thirty years he served on sea and land in many parts of the world. In the war with Spain he served on the battleship Massachusetts. His first command was the battleship Louisiana. During the memorable voyage of the Atlantic fleet around the world he was in command of the Virginia. His last active duty was as president of the Naval War College.

## ADMIRAL TOGO HAS ACUTE INDIGESTION

Boston, Mass., Aug. 17.—An attack of acute indigestion declared by his attendants to be slight, caused the cancellation of the programme of entertainment in honor of Admiral Togo, the Japanese Naval officer here today. The proposed trip of the admiral to Provincetown to receive the courtesies of the United States fleet also was abandoned.

"I don't sympathize much with Roosevelt in his laudation of numerous progeny. The French are wiser. I think, in contenting themselves with fewer children and being able to provide them with a proper scope for earning their livelihood."

## ENGLISH PHYSICIANS MAKE GREAT DISCOVERY

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 17.—Human lungs at altitude equal to that of Pike's Peak, 14,147 feet, are capable of absorbing forty to fifty per cent. more oxygen than at sea level and the red corpuscles of the blood are increased from five millions to 7,500,000 cubic millimetres, according to deductions made by Drs. J. S. Gordon Douglas and Yandell-Henderson of Oxford University, England. They have been making experiments at the summit of Pike's Peak for the last six weeks, in the interests of medical societies of England and Oxford University.

## SENTIMENT FAVORABLE IN RAMPOLLA

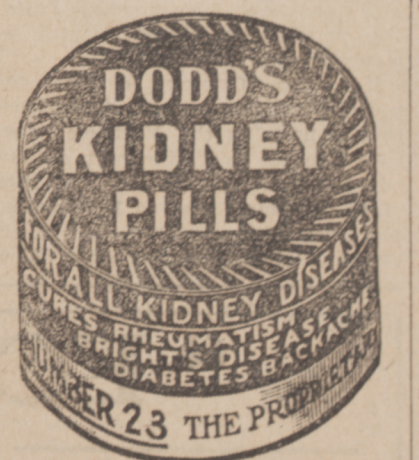
Rome, Aug. 17.—Cardinal Rampolla who is looked upon generally as the most prominent candidate of the Holy See in the event of the death of Pius X., reached his sixtieth anniversary today. The sentiment favorable to the Rampolla candidacy is not wholly personal to the famous cardinal, but is in part due to a feeling that circumstances on the political side of the Vatican interests demand at this time a pontiff of Rampolla's experience and abilities.

Cardinal Rampolla is an Italian by birth and education. He was proclaimed cardinal in 1887 and a few months later was named secretary of state, in which important position he soon established his reputation as one of the leading diplomats of the world. He has lived a retired life since the death of his former chief, Pope Leo XIII being head priest of St. Peter's.
