LIBERALS LINING UP
FOR SWEEPING VICTORY

(Continued from page one.)

The colonel quoted from the census returns to show how the population of New Brunswick had increased under the old reciprocity agreement, while it had practically stood still during the last ten years.

"We are not," said he, "going ahead in New Brunswick as fast as we should. Why should we be bled white for the benefit of other sections of the country. Why should it be disloyal for the farmers to sell their products in the United States. It is not disloyal for the bankers to loan money across the line, then why should it be disloyal for the farmers to sell their products there. If you engaged in farming as extensively as it is done in Asostock you would know by experience that you would glut the market. That's the reason you cannot keep your boys on the farm and they have to leave home in order to make a living."

In closing, the colonel dealt with the Tory canvass that he had not kept his promise.

He had made all the last election had been faithfully kept. The Tories had laughed at the idea of rural mail delivery, additional wharves and improved mail service, but his promises had been fulfilled. He had labored hard to give the counties of Sunbury and Queens what they were fairly entitled to and it was now for the people to say whether or not they wished him to continue as their representative. If they gave him a renewal of their confidence he could promise them that he would continue to work faithfully to advance their interests.

(Great cheering and cries of "We'll send you back.")

Mr. Copp followed Col. McLean in a half hour's speech which was most attentively listened to. He exposed the Gumbugging policy of Premier Hazen and his colleagues with respect to the Valley Railway and also dealt with the subject of reciprocity.

Senator King confined his remarks exclusively to the subject of reciprocity and advanced unanswerable arguments to show that the agreement was manifestly to the advantage of Canada.

Dr. Hetherington announced his intention of working hard for the election of Col. McLean.

The meeting broke up with hearty cheers for the King, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Col. McLean.

Hillsboro, N. B., Aug. 17.—Today will pass into history as a memorable one for Albert county, standing just now on the eve of great expansion along industrial lines, as the greatest aid towards that development, reciprocity with the United States was endorsed at a public meeting held in Hillsboro rink, addressed by Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works; Dr. D. H. McAlister, Liberal candidate for Kings-Albert, and other speakers.

About 1000 were present and the audience were very enthusiastic. A significant feature of the meeting was the number of St. John men and others, some of them Conservatives, who today inspected the shale deposit at Albert with a view to forming a \$1,000,000 company for the manufacture of cement from the oil shales found there. These gentlemen look forward to a great development in this county during the next few years.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY

Hon. William Pugsley was received with three hearty cheers from the audience. He thought the chairman's words could be accepted as the words of one having great weight, as one who had voted on the reciprocity question and one who fully realized its benefits.

Dr. Pugsley then referred to the question of the Salisbury & Harvey Railway. All were interested in having the railway taken over by the federal government, because it would give the people better service and cheaper freight rates. When the branch line became a part of the main line the people living along it were in as good a position as those on the main line.

The fact that nothing had been done to take over the railways before Dr. McAlister became a member was evidence that the task was not an easy one. The branch lines comprised altogether more than 600 miles and their purchase would mean a capital expenditure of several millions of dollars.

He was able to announce definitely that the settled policy of the government would be the absorption of the branch lines and last session a bill was introduced authorizing the minister to take over certain lines either by purchase or by long lease.

Dr. Pugsley asked Mr. Fowler to explain his connection with the removal of the rails from the lower part of the road. He would like to know why Fowler & Jones were allowed by the provincial government to remove these rails illegally.

RECIPROCITY THE GREAT QUESTION

Mr. Pugsley then dealt with the question of reciprocity, and said there could be no neutral grounds. The question was not the selection of

Dr. McAlister or Mr. Fowler but of the acceptance or rejection of this great offer, which might never again be made.

There was no shadow of evidence to prove, as Mr. Borden charged, that Canada was surrendering its freedom of action. If the overtures made by the United States for the renewal of reciprocity had been rejected, the Conservatives would have been the first to attack the government for their action. They would have quoted not only their own leaders but the Liberal leaders of the past in favor of free trade in natural products.

In reviewing the progress of the negotiations, the speaker paid a high tribute to Hon. Mr. Fielding as the originator of the British preference in face of Tory opposition. British connection and imperial trade were surely safer with this man under whose wise tariff policy the foreign trade had leaped from less than \$200,000,000 in 1896 to \$766,000,000 in 1910.

Speaking of lumber, the speaker showed how the removal of the \$1.25 duty on rough sawn lumber and the reduction of the \$2 duty on planed lumber was a great benefit to the man working in the lumber woods of New Brunswick.

REID FOR RESTIGOUCH

Dahousie, N. B., Aug. 17.—James Reid was again chosen as the standard bearer of the Liberal party in the county of Restigouch at a largely attended and very enthusiastic convention held here this afternoon.

Delegates from all the parishes were present in large numbers and those closest to the feeling of the electorate, declare that the indications point to another great victory for the party at the polls.

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

It is reported today that Mr. Harry A. Smith of Nashwaakasis one of the firm of McFarlane, Thompson and Anderson of this city will be a candidate for County Councillor at the approaching Municipal Elections. It is said that he and Coun. George L. Colter will form a ticket. Warden Rogers when seen today said he had not given the matter of offering for re-election much consideration.

NEW SPORT PUBLICATION

The first number of a new sporting paper the "Maritime Canadian Sports and Recreation" appeared in St. John yesterday published by W. H. Underhill. One of the articles in the issue is a lengthy review of the St. John Power Boat Club, containing pictures of the club house, Commodore Gerow, and the names of the boats, their owners and members. The paper is attractively gotten up.

He will visit many of the large cities and incidentally will consult with the leaders of organized labor in regard to the defense fund and other plans to aid the men who are soon to be put on trial in Los Angeles for the alleged dynamiting of the Times building in that city. Mr. Gompers' first stopping place will be Denver, after which he is to visit Salt Lake City, Butte, Spokane, Seattle, Vancouver, Tacoma and Portland. Labor Day will find him in San Francisco, where he will deliver the address before the organized labor bodies of that city and vicinity. A number of other California cities will be visited before he returns East.

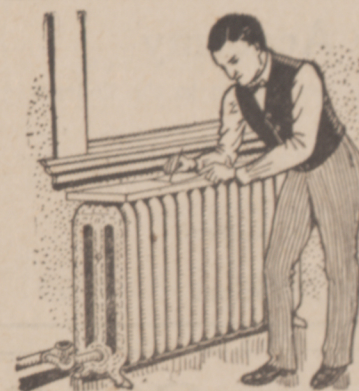
