### YANKEE TEAMS ORDERED NOT TO PLAY CORINTHIANS

British Football Association Declares Touring Team Outlawed—Decision may be Disregarded by Clubs

New York, August 16.—The forthcoming game at the polo grounds between the Corinthians of England and the New York State League is likely to cause one of the biggest soccer wars the east has ever seen. The American Football Association of Newark which controls soccer around the district, is governed by the Football Association of Great Britain and the English body has forbidden any American soccer football team from playing the Corinthians, claiming that this team is an outlaw organization. The Football Association has been accused by the soccer purists of trying to control soccer for mercenary reasons only, and they (the amateurs) would not tolerate such control, breaking away and forming the Amateur Football Association of Great Britain. There is a better fight going on at the present time over the seas between these two bodies, and the bad feeling is now being carried to this country.

A representative of the Glasgow Celtics, a team affiliated with the Scottish Football Association, who are amalgamated with the Football Association of England came over to this country to arrange a tour for his team and wanted a guarantee of \$5000 to play five games in the metropolitan district. This is a peculiar situation for the Football Association to be upholding in preference to the Corinthians (who are now making their fourth tour of this country) the team being all amateur players and composed mostly of Oxford and Cambridge College players, whose patron is King George V. and president, Lord Chief Justice Alverstone.

We are faced here with the situation of the Corinthians (recognized as one of the strongest soccer combinations in the world) touring this country, and because of petty differences in England, are to be deprived of the pleasure of witnessing this great team play in New York?

There are some independents among the Eastern soccer who will openly defy the edict of the American Football Association, and will pick a team from the league to play the Corinthians on the Polo Grounds on September 16.

This is as it should be. There is no reason why England's soccer differences should be dragged into this country, and why soccer in the United States should not be for and by Americans.
