UNFAVORABLE COMMENT ON COMMISSION CHANGES

WOULD START AT THE LEAST NOISE.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—The substitution of H. A. Powell, K. C., for A. P. Barnhill, K. C., and the replacing of other members of the Waterways Commission by Conservative henchmen, is regarded at Ottawa as carrying the patronage game to the utmost extreme.

The members of the waterways Commission were appointed by the imperial government before the election on the nomination of the Laurier government. Requiring the British government to cancel the appointment of Canadian Liberals and replace them by Tories is regarded as compelling the home government to participate in an undignified way in the spoils system which has been inaugurated by the Borden government. Speaking of the substitution Hon. Dr. Pugsley tonight said that he regarded it as most unfair and extreme. "The appointment of Mr. Barnhill and his associates was made at the request of the late government before this election. They are capable men and there does not seem to be any reason for replacing them except the desire of Mr. Borden to place thereon his friends."

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said: "In taking this action the Borden government seemed to be [reducing] the spoils system to a fine art. It is evidently an exemplification of the maxim 'to the victors belong the spoils.'"

REV. MR. FARRAR WAS ONCE REPORTER

Philadelphia, Nov. 27.—The Rev. Frederick Percival Farrar, late Chaplain of the King, who has been dismissed, was a reporter on the Public Ledger when he was about 20 years old. George W. Childs, then proprietor of the Ledger, was an intimate friend of Mr. Farrar's father, the late Canon Farrar of Westminster. The canon had a large family, and at one time when Mr. Childs was in London, the latter said he could use one of the boys on the Ledger staff. Frederick Percival was the one chosen and he was brought to this city by Mr. Childs and was practically made a member of the family, then dwelling in the handsome white marble residence at Twenty-second and Walnut streets. This was in 1892. After serving a short apprenticeship as a reporter, Mr. Farrar became private secretary to L. Clarke Davis, the managing editor of the paper. It was at this period that the met Mr. Davis's daughter, Miss Nora Davis. His father the canon, sent for him to return to England and study for the ministry. This he did, and soon after his graduation from a theological seminary he began his rapid rise to royal favor, and which culminated in his appointment as domestic chaplain to King George. He is about 40 years old and his wife is a few years his senior.
