LAW SCHOOL

AT U. N. B. AGAIN
BEFORE SENATE

Chancellor's Report Deals with Matter—Session Continued this Afternoon

The University of New Brunswick Senate held its semi-annual meeting this morning at the Education office, with Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, Chancellor Jones, Dr. M. MacLaren, St. John, Mr. W. H. Harrison, St. John, Dr. W. W. White, St. John, Mr. W. J. S. Myles, St. John; Mr. J. D. Phinney K. C., Fredericton; Senator J. D. Ellis, St. John; Judge Barry, Fredericton and Registrar Coy of this city in attendance.

The first business of the meeting consisted of the reading of the Auditor's Report, which was adopted and the accounts passed. A slight surplus was found which was stated to be chiefly due to the increased grant.

IMPORTANT MATTERS

Many other matters of business were discussed chief of which was the building of a new gate house and the establishing of a Law School in connection with the University. Nothing definite was decided concerning either proposition but the condition of the old porter's lodge is such that it must of necessity be pulled down and it is altogether likely that new quarters will be built immediately for the caretaker.

LAW SCHOOL

In the Chancellor's report which was passed by the meeting and which is to go before the provincial government provision was made for a department of law. This matter has been previously discussed but was deemed not feasible on former occasions owing to the limited amount of funds at the disposal of the Senate. Affiliation with the St. John Law School was also advocated but the proposition was abandoned for the same reason.

It is believed now, however, since the last increase in the provincial grant, that something may be done along this line and the result of this afternoon's meeting will be awaited with interest to see if there are any new developments. Many of the members are of the opinion that the School of Law would be self-sustaining as in the event of it becoming a certainty, it would attract no small amount of attention from prospective students.

COMPLIMENTED REGISTRAR.

Before adjournment of this morning's session the senate commented upon the efficient services rendered by Mr. Havelock Coy, who for many years has acted in the capacity of Registrar of the University, and a well earned increase in salary of \$200 was voted him.

It was thought that the Students' Cadet Corps movement would come up for discussion this morning, but the matter was not touched upon. The rifles and accoutrements for that body arrived here about two years ago and are stored at the Armory, but have never been called for by the students, who are believed to view the movement with marked disfavor.

The Senate met again this afternoon at three o'clock.

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE

IN ST. MARY'S CAUSES
MUCH TROUBLE

It is understood that Mr. Alexander Voyer of St. Mary's, will institute legal proceedings against Mr. W. H. Burns, principal of the St. Mary's-Gibson school, on account of injuries inflicted upon his son yesterday.

Mr. Burns had instructed the children of his school not to destroy the trees with which the grounds are decorated and on seeing young Voyer holding one of the trees and circling around it, he summoned him to his rooms and punished him.

Mr. Voyer states that the limbs of his son were black and blue from the punishment inflicted and while he has no objection to discipline being enforced, thinks it should not take such a form.

The trustees were consulted this morning concerning the matter and it is the intention of the boy's father to press the matter.

Y.M.C.A. NIGHT SCHOOL.

The night school of the Y.M.C.A. starts on Friday and lectures in elementary work will be given on Tuesday and Friday evenings during the winter months. The membership at present reaches twelve. Some of the pupils are more or less advanced in years. It is expected that a material increase in membership will be noted as soon as the school is under way. The classes will be from 7.30 to 9.00 and the fee is nominal.

NOTICES ISSUED
BY CHIEF SUPT.

School Teachers and Pupils to Assist in War Against Dreaded Brown-Tail Moth

Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, has issued official notices, ordering the different schools to observe certain regulations concerning the flying of the British flag on school days, lectures to be given from a prescribed book on civics, the extermination of the brown-tailed moth and the teaching of music in all public schools.

While the majority of these orders are innovations in the present school system it is expected that they will be viewed with pleasure by both pupils and teachers. The first regulation is providential from a patriotic standpoint and the latter are much needed reforms, that in reference to the killing of the dreaded moth being especially beneficial to the country at large.

OFFICIAL NOTICES.

The following are the official notices as issued by the Board of Education:

"The school flag shall be flown on every fine day while school is in session, except in the winter and more inclement seasons of the year, and may be displayed on any day."

It has also been ordered that a text book in Civics be prescribed for teachers' use and that hereafter a knowledge of that subject be a general requirement for all classes of license.

Teachers, school officers and pupils are requested to co-operate with the agricultural authorities in the work of exterminating the brown-tail moth.
