MAKERS DO NOT CATER TO COLONIAL DEMANDS

Mr. R. H. F. Baird, managing proprietor of the Belfast Evening Telegraph, one of a party of twelve British journalists, who recently made a nine weeks' tour through Canada, was interviewed on his return by The London Canadian Mail. He laid considerable emphasis on the familiar story of the reluctance of British manufacturers to adapt their products to the conditions of the Canadian market. Perfect candor, however, compels admission that there has been a vast improvement in this respect in recent years as the result of the strong representations that have been made on the subject to the Old Country firms themselves.

"We saw," said Mr. Baird, "typical instances of the failure of British manufacturers to appreciate the regularities of the market for which they were catering, and instances of their failure to sympathetically respond were again and again seen. Merchants had, in fact, complained that because of this they had to go to Germany and elsewhere for their goods, where their desires were promptly given effect to, and where they were not met with the cold rejoinder, 'This is our way of doing it.'"

"A striking feature of the present year," continued Mr. Baird, "was the remarkable influx of British capital to the Dominion, and the number of visits from well-known financial magnates and business men that had taken place. The grand total of British money now invested in Canada had been officially estimated at \$420,000,000, of which sum no less than \$75,000,000 was invested in 1910. In fact, 81 per cent. of the entire Canadian issues of that year had been taken up in Britain, and financiers of high eminence had stated that at least \$100,000,000 of British money would this year be the contribution from the Mother Country to Canadian investments."

INTERNATIONAL OPIUM CONFERENCE

The Hague, Dec. 1.—Representatives of many nations have assembled here to take part in the much-discussed and long-delayed international conference for the suppression of the opium traffic. The purpose of the conference is to give effect to the resolutions of the international opium commission, which met in Shanghai early in 1909 and to endeavor to secure an agreement upon uniform laws and regulations to control the production, manufacture and distribution of opium, its derivatives and preparations. The effort will also be made to regulate the shipment of opium, restrict the cultivation of the poppy, authorize the search of vessels for contraband opium, and finally to create an international commission to carry out the agreement.

Bishop Bratt of the Philippines, heading the American delegation, has been selected to preside at the conference. Other members of the American delegation, has been selected to preside at the conference. Other members of the American delegation are Dr. Hamilton Wright of Maine and Henry F. Finger of California, with Frederick L. Muidekoper of Washington, D.C., as secretary. The British delegates are Cecil Clement Smith, who attended the conference at Shanghai; Sir William Stevenson Meyer, formerly financial secretary in the Government of India; William Grenfell Max-Mueller, councillor of the British embassy at
