DESIRE TO HOLD OFFICE UNITES BORDEN CABINET

(Halifax Chronicle.)

Edmund Burke defined party as "a body of men united for promoting, by their joint endeavors, the national interests upon some particular principle on which they are all agreed."

The Conservative party in Canada has been completely merged in the flag-flapper brigade, and has no longer an independent existence. The flag-flappers are in power as a political organization. On what are they united, except the enthusiastic desire to hold office?

Until he broke definitely with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Borden, their boss, was denounced by the politicians who now meekly accept his mastership as the embodiment of disloyalty and as a menace to all things British. Only a couple of years ago, Mr. Monk, Mr. Borden's Quebec colleague, in the nominal leadership of the flag-flapper combination, openly repudiated Mr. Borden and spurned his policy. Mr. Borden, at the same time repudiated Mr. Monk. Some three years ago Mr. Clifford Sifton, who, although not a member of the flag-flapper administration, had much to do with its creation, was being called names, and accused of political crimes almost too vile for repetition. Mr. White, Mr. Borden's minister of finance, was a Liberal and therefore, either a false-pretence man or an anti-protectionist, this time last year. Mr. Borden himself was a Liberal and a free trader so long as free trade was a real issue in Canadian politics. Mr. George E. Foster, one of Mr. Borden's chief lieutenants in the cabinet, was read out of his party, two years ago, by leading newspaper organs of that party. He was openly shunned by Mr. Borden for a long time.

But a few months ago Mr. Monk's two Quebec lieutenants in the cabinet were talking about "shoot'n' holes in the British flag," and decriing all things imperial. Mr. Borden's new Orange Speaker of the Commons, up to the time of his election to that position, was waging ruthless warfare against Quebec Catholicism, whilst his new French-Canadian assistant in the Speakership was raging against Ontario Protestantism. Each of them was representing Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to their respective audiences, as the chief bulwark of the iniquities of Quebec Catholicism and Ontario Protestantism, which they were respectively denouncing. Mr. Borden's other associates in the cabinet are mostly so insignificant personally that nobody knows or greatly cares what they have been saying or doing. One thing only is reasonably certain—that each of them has

been flatly contradicting some other one or more of them.

Upon what "particular principle are they all agreed," now, to entitle them to call themselves a party under Burke's definition? Are they party, or are they merely a mob in office—a mob of howling, professional flag-flappers, agreed on nothing but the charms of pay-day and the pleasures of drawing their salaries? We leave the question to the public.

Alexander Pope has also left us a definition of party. In his "Thoughts on Various Subjects," he says:

"Party is the madness of the many for the benefit of the few."

In view of the state of affairs at Ottawa, how do the two definitions—the latter in particular—strike such Nova Scotians as voted against reciprocity—which would have given the people of this province the great industrial opportunity for which they and their fathers have so long been singing—in order that they might take a hand in "saving the empire" by handing over the government of Canada to the dictatorship of Mr. Henri Bourassa and the Quebec Nationalists, the openly avowed enemies of all things imperial?

Did Nova Scotians who voted against reciprocity and for the flag-flappers' vote for the good of the many or for the benefit of the lucky few? There need be no hurry about the answer. There will be plenty of time to think it over.

1745—John Jay, first chief justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, born. Died May 17, 1829.

1753—The New York Assembly passed an act for the registry of mortgages, to prevent fraud.

1757—Colley Cibber, noted dramatist and actor, died. Born in London in 1671.

1787—Pennsylvania ratified the federal constitution.

1812—Hon. John S. Macdonald, Canadian statesman, born. Died on June 1, 1872.

1830—National Republic party, at Baltimore, nominated Henry Clay for president.

1870—J. H. Rainey of South Carolina, the first negro member of Congress, sworn in.

1876—Vade Hampton was declared elected governor of South Carolina.

1889—Robert Browning, noted English poet, died. Born May 7, 1812.

1894—Sir John Thompson, Canadian premier, died while visiting Queen Victoria at Windsor.

1910—President Taft nominated Edward Douglass White of Louisiana to be chief justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The various suits pending against the corporation and its subsidiaries will be dismissed for the reason that all of the points involved in the suits were covered in the recent decisions of the United States Supreme Court.
