## 600 MOOSE LEGALLY KILLED IN NOVA SCOTIA

(Halifax Chronicle)

Reports from all sections of the Province regarding the number of moose shot during this year's season show that just 600 were legally killed, that is, reported, as the game law requires, as well as shot. Any that were shot during the season and not reported to the Chief Game Commissioner were illegally taken and persons are liable to a heavy penalty for having failed to comply with the requirements of the act, one of which is that every person who kills a moose shall, within 30 days thereafter, send to the Chief Game Commissioner, by registered post, a notice in writing of where and when he killed such moose.

The open season for moose is from Sept. 16th to November 16th. As the Game Act stands at present, killing of cow moose is forbidden, as it has been for two years previous. But unless that act is changed at the coming session of the Legislature the special protection of the cow expires in September next. This provision of the Act has been subjected to some criticism since it went into operation three years ago, it being urged in some districts that the three years' protection of the cow was not as beneficial to propagation of the species as was anticipated, but perhaps had a contrary effect. The yield of the three seasons, however, does not seem to prove this contention, as each successive year has seen a larger number shot. The first year the total legally shot was over 400, in the year following nearer 500, and this year an even 600, all bull moose. This would seem to show the species to be multiplying, especially as in many districts, independent of the number taken, moose signs were reported plentiful. It is just possible the period of protection of the cow may be extended beyond 1912, and also that a short open season in December will be arranged for the benefit of people resident in the country and not for city or foreign sportsmen. The numbers shot in the different counties of the Province this season were as follows:

It is probable that when the reports of the wardens come in from the different districts, the total number of moose killed will be increased by fifty or more, because of illegal taking, for which there have been several prosecutions, with possibly more to follow, and that total will be a pretty good showing for the province's yield for the year. As will be seen, Halifax leads as a moose hunting county, with a yield of 160, over double the number of the next highest county, Queens, with 78, and Antigonish, with 77.

The yearly reports of the game wardens show the number of illegal killings growing less and there seems to be more general compliance with the provisions of the Act than a few years ago. In some cases the illegal killings are shown to be due to ignorance of the requirements of the Act, not in defiance of the law, but there are still cases occurring where lack of respect for the law seems evident.

## CHARGED OF MUR- DER OF FATHER

Vincennes, Ind. Dec. 12.—Everything is in readiness for the trial of S. Edward Stibbins, the young man who is charged with first degree murder as the result of the mysterious killing of his father George W. Stibbins. The case was on the court calendar for today and it is expected to proceed with the trial without delay.

The elder Stibbins was shot and killed while feeding cattle on his farm near Petersburg on the night of November 17 last. The revolver used by the murderer was taken out of the mud near where the body was found. The theory of suicide was advanced by members of the Stibbins family, but the authorities placed no credence in it after it was shown that the man wore heavy mittens and that there were no powder marks near the wound.

The son S. Edward Stibbins was taken into custody and later charged with murder upon evidence that he had been on unfriendly terms with his father for some time and was unable to give a satisfactory account of his whereabouts at the time the crime was committed. The accused man is 32 years old and a graduate of the State Normal School. For some years he has been engaged in teaching. Other members of the Stibbins family have declined to discuss the crime other than to assert their belief in the innocence of the son.

in India and that further generous gifts would be made for the same purpose. He also announced that a half months pay would be granted to the non-commissioned officers and the men as well as the rest of the British army in India, and that officers and men of the native army in India would be eligible hereafter to be awarded the Victoria Cross for bravery on the battlefield.

A half-month's pay was also granted to subordinate civil servants and certain classes of prisoners were released from jail. Another important change announced by Lord Harding was that the seat of government was in future to be transferred from Calcutta to Delhi. The greatest of Durbar ever held in India then came to an end, with the National Anthem, and a final burst from the silver trumpets. As the King-Emperor and Queen-Emress accompanied by Lord and Lady Harding and their suites left the amphitheatre, they were cheered time and again by the crowd until they reached their tents.

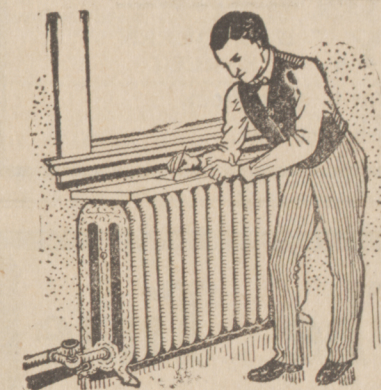
