MEMORIAL TO GENERAL BULLER

London, Oct. 28.—A throng of notable army officers journeyed to Winchester today for the unveiling of the memorial to General Sir Redvers Buller erected in Winchester Cathedral by his old regiment the King's Royal Rifle Corps. Field Marshal Lord Grenfell officiated at the unveiling. The monument, which takes the form of a recumbent life-size figure in bronze, was designed by Bertram McKennal and attracted much attention at the Royal Academy exhibition this year. The pedestal bears the simple inscription, "A great leader beloved by his men."

OFFICERS OF THE DOMINION W.C.T.U.

Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 27.—At Wednesday's sessions of the Dominion W. C. T. U. Convention, the following officers were elected:

President, Mrs. Gordon Wright, London.

Vice-President, Mrs. McKinney, Claresholm, Alberta.

Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Hattie Stevens, Toronto.

Recording Secretary, Mrs. McLachlan, Montreal.

Treasurer, Mrs. Bullock, St. John.

"Y" Secretary, Miss Eleanor Smith, Windsor, N.S.

Loyal Temperance Legion Secretary, Mrs. McLachlan, Hamilton.

All were re-elected.

The report of Mrs. Blanche Reed Johnston, editor of The S. S. Temperance Quarterly, was given and it was a splendid story of advance. The report of the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Hattie Stevens, Toronto, showed that the past biennial term has seen the greatest advance in Dominion W. C. T. U. history, especially in membership, loyal temperance legions and medal contest work. The membership has reached 14,233, an increase of nearly 2,000 since the last convention. Every province from Ontario to the Pacific Coast reports an increase. There are now twenty libraries under W. C. T. U. auspices, three homes, two shelters, two creches, two coffee houses and one sailors' rest. Ontario and New Brunswick report sending three missionaries to the lumber camps in their respective provinces, besides hundreds of comfort bags and a large amount of literature.

A franchise conference led by Mrs. Delton, North Bay, was held this afternoon, the greatest interest and enthusiasm prevailing. It was contended that women should have the franchise, because of the benefits that would come to the nation on temperance and moral reform lines, through the ballot in the hands of the women. After a lively discussion it was decided to inaugurate a campaign, and the following resolution was carried, moved by Mrs. Sanderson, Quebec, and seconded by Mrs. Sparks, Kingston:

"That each province union begin an active campaign for women's enfranchisement, demanding the ballot because women are citizens."

Ontario White Ribboners were urged to interview candidates for the coming elections as to their attitude towards women's suffrage.

Mrs. Gordon, Ottawa, editor of the official organ, in her report stated that the subscriptions had increased nearly two thousand during the last term. Mrs. Gordon reported the paper is now self-sustaining.

Mrs. Rutherford, honorary president, of Toronto, having arrived, briefly addressed the convention, as did also Mrs. Roberts of Montreal, secretary of the Dominion Alliance.
