MONCTON PROS CAPTURED SECOND STARR TROPHY MATCH

Game Was Fast and Rough—Moncton Has Margin of 8 Goals Over Halifax.

Moncton, Feb. 28.—The second game in the Starr trophy series between Moncton and Halifax took place this evening before 500 spectators. It was fairly fast in spots, but rather tame for the fans coming so soon after Saturday night's spectacular contest with the Canadiens. The game finished 9 to 5 in favor of Moncton.

The teams were the same as in previous games, except that Doran did not appear on Moncton's lineup on account of his injured knee. Norman took his place at cover point and Moncton's spare, McDonald, took right wing. There was considerable rough work. Norman was off the ice three times, twice for tripping, one minute each, and two minutes for knee checking. Dunphy, Scott and Dunphy were off three minutes each for mixing it up. Brown was off three minutes for tripping and Scott and Condon once each for the same offence. Shorty Trites refereed.

Moncton now leads by 8 goals, in the Starr trophy series, the totals being 17 to 9. The final games will be played in Halifax on Thursday and Friday of this week.

CLIFFSIDES LOST TO NEW YORK 4 to 3

New York, Feb. 28.—The second of the series of five games which crack Canadian hockey teams have come to New York to play with local clubs, was an easy victory for the New York Athletic Club tonight.

They defeated the Cliffside of Ottawa, a team of clever and young players, by a score of 4 to 3. Neither side developed any noteworthy team-play in the game. As individuals the New Yorkers were more accurate shots than the Canadians. Goal Keeper McKinley was busy preventing several near goals. Mallon, who roves for New York, drove over two of the four scores, and Sims and Denesha one each.

SASKATCHEWAN LANDS SELLING VERY WELL

Winnipeg, Feb. 27.—Heavy transactions in farm lands have been the feature of business here this week. Saskatchewan properties are affected, and land is being sold in large tracts. Three deals, aggregating 100,000 acres, were put through today at good prices, the buyers being representatives of farmers in the Western States. The transactions are important in themselves, but they also reflect increased enthusiasm on the part of Americans for farm investments in Western Canada. Huge immigration from Iowa, Nebraska and Illinois is indicated for the present season, and it is likely that the records will again be broken. The advertising offered by the reciprocity negotiations and the subsequent discussion are held to be partly responsible for the increased activity.

General business is moderately active, and there is no development of an important character. Retail trade is better and more attention is being paid to spring goods. Great improvement in transportation conditions is noted as a result of the mild weather. All lines are now open, and shipments are being sent forward with more promptness. Increase of freight traffic is shown by huge gains in railway earnings. C.P.R. for the third week of February reports \$267,000 more than for the same week last year. Wholesale houses are very busy with shipments in and out. They are catching up with their orders, and hope to establish an equilibrium soon.

The continuation of warm weather with heavy thaws is arousing concern in agricultural circles. If the

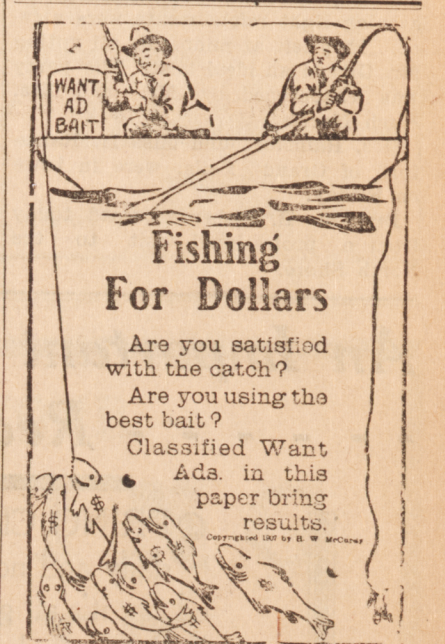
