# CIVIC POLITICS DISCUSSED BY MR. J. D. PHINNEY

J. D. Phinney lectured on temperance to a large audience in the Methodist church last evening. He briefly reviewed the progress of the temperance cause in this country from the days of Sir Leonard Tilly to the present, and showed how in those earlier days a man who would not drink liquor was looked upon odium and contempuously called a "Tillyman." In noting the steady advance he cited the days when there were at least two hundred liquor saloons in St. John as compared with sixty odd at present.
