After many congratulations the happy couple drove to Mrs. Estey's where tea was served and then left for their future home. Here they were welcomed by quite a number of their friends, the young men of the place turning out with a band and serenaded them. Mrs. Poor came from Birmingham two years ago.

GALLOWAY CASE BEFORE DIVORCE COURT THIS MORNING

Plaintiff on Stand All the Time—Co-respondents to be Called as Witnesses.

The case of Maud Katherine Evans vs William Herbert Evans, in which Miss Laura Moore is named as co-respondent, was continued when court resumed at 2.30 p.m. yesterday.

Mr. Teed put in evidence certified copies of marriage license and marriage certificate.

Deputy Provincial Secretary R.W.L. Tibbits was sworn and told of registration of marriage. The book registry was put in evidence.

H. Douglas Bishop, brother of the plaintiff, and Samuel Bishop, her father, gave evidence of cruelty and neglect shown the defendant toward the plaintiff.

Mr. Teed argued in support of judgment. His Honor stated judgment would be given at an early date.

The case of Galloway vs. Galloway was taken up in the Divorce Court before Judge McKeown this morning. A large number of spectators were present, attracted by the fact that the case was a local one. Mr. P. A. Guthrie appeared for the plaintiff, George William Galloway and Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., for the defendant Martha Anne Galloway. The plaintiff was the only witness examined this morning. This afternoon the young son of the parties to the case will probably be examined. The co-respondents named in the case, both young men belonging to this city, are also likely to be called to the stand.

EVIDENCE OF PLAINTIFF

The plaintiff gave evidence concerning the marriage of himself and defendant in Toronto in 1888. He stated that he had had suspicions of his wife's misconduct for some time before instituting proceedings, but could not say just when those suspicions were first aroused. He had been told by Annie Belmore, a woman who kept a house on King Street that the defendant had been guilty of misconduct with the co-respondents in the case in her house. The defendant had been present when such information had been given. Witness had gone to the house and had gained the confidence of his informant for the purpose of learning the truth concerning the misconduct of the defendant. Witness told also of finding defendant in a room in the drill hall in a state of intoxication. Witness denied charges of cruelty and stated that he had no knowledge of upsetting a lamp at his home while in a state of intoxication. During his career in the Royal Canadian Regiment which began in 1888 he had a clean sheet. During the past year the defendant had lodged a complaint of ill-treatment by him with the police magistrate. She had not pressed the charge however.

TEMPERANCE AND CIVIC POLITICS DISCUSSED BY MR. J. D. PHINNEY

J. D. Phinney lectured on temperance to a large audience in the Methodist church last evening. He briefly reviewed the progress of the temperance cause in this country from the days of Sir Leonard Tilley to the present, and showed how in those earlier days a man who would not drink liquor was looked upon as an outcast and contemptuously called a "Tillyman." In noting the steady advance he cited the days when there were at least two hundred liquor saloons in St. John as compared with sixty odd at present. Every town, village, and district had a proportionate number. Crime was more common and business more interfered with by the liquor traffic. Even clergymen in general saw not the evil then as they do now. The rise of liquor by the community was considered necessary to health, wealth and happiness.

LOCAL SITUATION

Having roundly condemned the traffic and the iniquitous effects he in closing, made reference to the local situation and highly commends such efforts as were put forth recently to enforce the Canada Temperance Act. "The men who enforce temperance laws are the most likely to be efficient in the transacting of the general business of a city," said the speaker. "Such proved to be the case in Fredericton during the past year. We had a council last year the majority of whom were temperance men and who made an honest effort to enforce our temperance laws, and with in my recollection no council transacted the business of the city more efficiently. So much so that the indications are that if the same council is returned next year our taxes will be reduced and yet the necessary claims of the city met."

CATTLE-JUDGING DEMONSTRATIONS TOOK PLACE TODAY

Dairy-Cattle Judging This Morning and Beef-Cattle This Afternoon—Large Attendance.

The attention of those in attendance at the annual meeting of the Farmer's and Dairymen's Association of New Brunswick was devoted this morning and this afternoon to cattle-judging demonstrations which was given by Prof. Cumming of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro. On account of the failure to obtain the use of the drill hall for the purpose of making the demonstrations the latter were held in the basement of the City Hall. Owing to the lack of space Prof. Cumming worked under difficulties, but his demonstrations were viewed by large numbers of farmers and others.

DAIRY CATTLE

This morning Prof. Cumming gave a demonstration in the judging of dairy cattle. Three animals were used, belonging to Mr. A. B. Neill, of Gibson, Mr. F. B. Hatheway of Springhill and Mr. Walter Limerick, of Lower St. Mary's.

BEUF CATTLE

This afternoon the demonstration in the judging of beef cattle took place. The animals used were the property of Mr. John Jewett of Mactaquac, Mr. McCullough of Keswick Ridge and Mr. Ben Goodine of Kingsclear.

EVENING PROGRAM

Tonight there will be another session of the association in the Opera House. Mr. E. A. Schofield and Prof. Cumming will lead a discussion on the encouragement of dairying and the Dairy Committee will report. There will also be discussion upon Agricultural Society Regulations. The nominating committee will also be appointed.

FEBRUARY MARKED BY LOW TEMPERATURE AND LIGHT SNOWFALL

Temperature Was Three Degrees Below Average For Past Thirty Seven Years.

February 1911 was one of the coldest months on record. Chancellor Jones of the U. N. B., who is in charge of the meteorological station in the city reports that the average temperature for the month was 11 above zero. The highest temperature of the month was 44 above zero on February 27th. The lowest was 22 below on the 13th. During the last thirty-seven years the average temperature for February has been 14 above the cipher, so February 1911 has the distinction of being one of the coldest months on record. In 1910 the average temperature for the month was 16.7 above zero, that being an exceptionally high average.

MUCH SUNSHINE

Although distinguished by remarkably cold weather February had more hours of bright sunshine than that month has usually, the records showing that the sun shone brightly for 165 hours. The wind mileage of the month was 6285, a figure in no way remarkable.

PRECIPITATION LIGHT

In total precipitation there was a marked falling off however. The records show that the rainfall during the month was .22 inches and the snowfall 12.5 inches which makes a total precipitation of 1.47 inches. The average precipitation for February during the time in which meteorological records have been kept has been 4 inches.

The funeral of the late Mrs. T. V. Monaghan took place this afternoon at Oromocto and was largely attended. Service was conducted at the church of St. Vincent de Paul by Rev. Father Howland. Interment was made at Oromocto.
