LATE GOVERNMENT

SET A GOOD MARK

There have been nine administrations in Canada since Confederation. The names of the ministries and the length of time they lasted were as follows:

1—Right Honorable Sir J. A. Macdonald, Premier. From July 1st, 1867, to November 6th, 1873, (6 years, 96 days).

2—Honorable A. Mackenzie, Premier. From November 7th, 1873, to October 16th, 1879, (5 years, 312 days).

3—Right Honorable Sir J. A. Macdonald, Premier. From October 17th, 1879, to June 6th, 1891, (11 years, 229 days).

4—Honorable Sir J. J. C. Abbott, Premier. From June 16th, 1891, to December 5th, 1892, (1 year, 71 days).

5—Honorable Sir J. Thompson, Premier. From December 5th, 1892, to December 12th, 1894, (2 years, 7 days).

6—Honorable Sir M. Bowell, Premier. From December 21st, 1894, to April 27th, 1896, (1 year, 127 days).

7—Honorable Sir C. Tupper, Bart., Premier. From May 1st, 1896, to July 8th, 1896, (69 days).

8—Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, July 11th, 1896, to October 3rd, 1911, (15 years, 77 days).

9—Honorable R. L. Borden, Premier, October 10, 1911.

The ministry of Sir Wilfrid Laurier holds the record for unbroken length of rule. It likewise goes into Canadian history with the record of achievements in the country's interest and with the record of growth and progress in wealth, population, agriculture, mining, manufacturing, commerce, and, in fact, in every department of human effort, Canada is doing very well, and Sir Wilfrid's government has set a good mark.—Hamilton Times.

TEACHERS MEET IN DETROIT

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 2.—Detroit was the mecca today for the public school teachers of Michigan. More than 6000 of them, coming from every county of the state and representing every branch of educational work from the rural school to the university, flocked into the city to take part in the annual convention of their State Association. The first of the general sessions was held this afternoon and was featured by the presidential address of Prof. Elmer A. Lyman, of the Michigan State Normal College, and an address by Prof. Henry Suzzalo, of the Teachers' College of Columbia University. The sessions will continue over tomorrow and will be brought to a close tomorrow evening with an address by Governor Osborn of Michigan. In addition to the general sessions the programme provides for numerous department conferences.

TAFT HELPS INSTALL COLLEGE HEAD

Morgantown, W. Va., Nov. 1.—With President Taft heading the list of distinguished visitors, the inauguration here today of Dr. Thomas E. Hodges as president of the West Virginia University proved a red-letter day in the history of the institution. Among the noted educators present were President Alderman of the University of Virginia, President Thompson of Ohio State University, President Perry of Marietta College, President Welch of Ohio Wesleyan University, and President Sparks of Pennsylvania State College. The attendance included also many alumni and other friends of the university from all parts of the country.

CARLETON TORIES TO BANQUET PREMIER

Woodstock, Nov. 1.—The banquet to be tendered to Premier Fleming by the Conservative Association of Carleton County, on Friday evening, promises to be the biggest event of the kind ever held in this town. The banquet will take place in the Opera House, as that is the only building in town capable of accommodating the very large number of guests who will be in attendance. Covers will be laid for more than 200, and this number may be increased as at present there are more than that many acceptances.

George E. Balmain, president of the Conservative Association of Carleton County, will probably preside and it is probable that the toast list will include The King, The Governor General, the Lieutenant Governor, Our Guest, the Dominion Parliament and the Provincial Legislature.

It is expected that the toast to the Dominion Parliament will be responded to by O. S. Crockett, M.P. for York County, and B. Frank Smith, of Carleton County. The cause of the Provincial Legislature will be championed by members of the provincial government and at present it is expected that Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, attorney general, Hon. H. F. McLeod, provincial secretary, and Hon. Geo. J. Clark, speaker of the legislative assembly, will be in attendance.

From the list of acceptances, it is evident that every county in the province will be represented on Friday evening when the guests assemble to do honor to Premier Fleming.
