### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

### Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

(1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light Limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.

(2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.

(3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.

(4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures. City Hall, January 20th. 1911.

## CANADIENS AND MONCTON PLAYED TIE SATURDAY NIGHT

Score Was 2 to 2 With Moncton Claiming Another Coal-Clean Fast Hockey—Scott May Go to Montreal.

Moncton, Feb. 26.—The speedy Canadiens played a tie game here last night with Moncton's professionals, two all. Never have Moncton fans seen such sport on the ice. The play was mostly in the visitors' territory and many claimed that the score should have been three one in favor of the home team. The Canadiens were given a goal which many claimed they were not entitled to while Moncton claimed another goal that was not allowed. Certainly the visitors got the benefit of the double in both cases.

About a thousand people saw a good clean game, there being an entire absence of anything like objectionable plays. The only penalty handed out was one minute to Payan of the Canadiens for tripping.

Moncton seemed to be speedier than in any of the professional games. Their stick handling and shooting was excellent and but for the good work of the visitors' goal who had many hard stops to his credit, the Montreal team would have been trimmed to a finish.

### PLAY WAS FAST

The game started at a lightning clip and though Moncton seemed to have the best of the territory, the visitors chalked up their only two goals in the first half. Moncton rushed things in the second period and fairly played the visitors off their feet but they put on such a stubborn defence that it was fourteen minutes before Crockett scored the first goal for the home team on a pass from Scott. Scott, shortly after tied the score on a well timed pass from Nicholls.

### THROUGH THE SIDE

A third goal was claimed by Moncton but the goal judge said the puck did not enter from the front of the net but was shot through a hole in the side. The Canadiens goal that was disputed was from what was alleged to be an offside play.

The game was fast and clean, and only one penalty was imposed. At the end of the first half Boston had a 1 to 1 lead.

Pal Moore and Young Sammy Smith have been signed by Tom O'Rourke to box at his New York club March 10.

Scott was the star of the evening and had a big lead on all the other forwards. Time after time he carried the puck to the visitors' end but it was hard to get past their star point, Jack Laviolette. Scott, however broke up the Canadiens individual rushes and combination work and was a revelation to them.

Norman played his best game of the season and Doran played whirlwind hockey until he lost his foot cut in a collision with Pitre's skate. His injuries were so serious that in the second half he had to give up his position at forward to Brown, who played in good style.

For the visitors Vezina, Pitre, and Laviolette starred. Vezina appeared to be puck proof and it was to his good work and that of Laviolette particularly that the visitors owe the fact that they are not taking back with them a square defeat. Mc Namara refereed.
