LIBERALISM WILL  
'MAKE FRESH START'

(Toronto Globe.)

Defeated at the polls, but in no way disheartened, the Liberal party in Canada must at once gather itself together for a fresh start. The splendid unselfishness of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in answering the call to take his place in parliament as leader of the opposition is a challenge to every true Liberal from Sydney to Victoria. Nothing less than instant and hearty response to that call of the noblest of leaders will be worthy of that challenge. Without a day's delay or any vain regrets, but seeing the cloud's unexpected silver lining, those who care first for the Liberal cause will take their stand and set their faces again to the night task which is the enduring cause of Liberalism—the cause of freedom, progress and the people's rights.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier meets parliament he will have at his back a body of men superior, man for man, to any like number on the government benches. In debate they can do battle without either asking quarter or giving it. The younger men will prove worthy of the leaders who went down to defeat and the freedom of opposition will develop their powers. From Nova Scotia to New Brunswick strong men with trained leaders will come. Quebec's large and vigorous contingent will have Hon. R. Lemieux and Hon. Dr. Beaudet at its head. The prairie provinces have spoken on the trade issue with an emphasis which parliament will be made to understand, and Ontario, where alone the disaster was serious, will not be ashamed or afraid for its thin red line from Hon. Chas. Murphy on the Ottawa to Mr. A. H. Clarke on the Detroit. All they need is Hon. George P. Graham as their leader and as Sir Wilfrid's lieutenant. Let there be no mistake, that body of men, unhampered by administrative details and uncursored with patronage, will give parliament and Canada what has not been known in Ottawa in fifteen years—an opposition that really counts.

The first and essential thing is the unreserved acceptance of the principles and program of Liberalism. This is the time for Liberals all over Canada to call to mind the purpose and spirit of Liberalism everywhere. British Liberals, with the aggressive policies of reform, owe their power in office to their rejuvenation when out of office. In Canada the struggle is the same. Here as there the common people are being spoiled of their opportunities and of their rights by privileged selfishness and leagued money power. The burden of the cost of living is well-nigh intolerable to the average household. The evil of food taxation and food monopolies must be attacked stoutly, determinedly, unflinchingly. That evil is as real and if unchecked will grow to be as cruel in Canada as it is in the United States. The conditions of trade not only with the rest of the Empire, but with the United States, must be improved. The fight for better trade relations and for untaxed food for the common people has only begun. It is the fight from which Liberals must not and will not turn back.

And old-time Liberals will not fight alone. A few may have turned back, but from among the people a great new host will arise and join with us if only we are true and unwavering. Some were deceived and misled on Thursday last. Appeals to their half-conscious resentments against the United States and to their racial and religious prejudices blinded them for the moment. But

the reaction will set in. When they find how dearly they will have to pay, one by one, for the evil counsel which swayed them in crowds they will learn the truth and justice of the cause for which, on their behalf, Sir Wilfrid Laurier fought and fell. Then they will be Liberals not in name only, but in deed.

Canada is more important than any. The causes of justice and freedom and equal rights are greater than the honors or the spoils of administrative power. Stripped of the impediments of office, Liberalism now makes a fresh start. The announcement that their loved and trusted leader is willing and ready is the bugle call.

NEW ISSUE OF STOCK

Montreal, Sept. 24.—The Bell Telephone Company of Canada are about to cut a "melon." The Company have decided to issue \$2,500,000 of new stock, giving shareholders one share of new for every five shares now held. The new stock will be issued at par. This will make the paid up capital of the company \$55,000,00. The company sent out this letter: "At a meeting of the directors held at the office of the company on the 13th day of September, 1911, acting under the powers conferred upon them by the stockholders at the special meeting held on the 22nd of February, 1906, it was decided to increase the paid-up capital of the company from \$12,500,000 to \$15,000,000. Each stockholder of record the 30th of September, 1911 is entitled to take at par, shares of the new stock in the proportion of one share for every five shares now held. Subscriptions will only be accepted for full shares."

## TAFT LAYS CORNER STONE

Topeka, Kas., Sept. 27.—When President Taft arrived this morning in Topeka, the first important stop on his day's schedule, he found the city profusely dressed in patriotic attire and an enormous crowd on hand to do him honor. A party of distinguished representatives of the State of Kansas accompanied the President from Hutchinson, while another party of State and city officials and leading citizens of Topeka was in waiting at the station to greet him when he stepped from his special train. After the welcome formalities had been concluded the President was taken in charge by the reception committee and escorted by a parade through the gayly decorated streets of the downtown district. At the conclusion of the parade the President delivered a brief address at the laying of the corner stone for the State Soldiers' Memorial Hall to be erected in this city. At the conclusion of the programme the presidential train left for Atchison and Leavenworth.

## TO ACCOMPANY TAFT ON IOWA TRIP

Council Bluffs, Ia., Sept. 27.—Upon the arrival of his special train here early tomorrow morning President Taft will be met by Governor Carroll, Senator Kenyon and several of the members of the Iowa congressional delegation. The entire party will accompany the President on his Iowa tour, which will occupy two entire days and include stops in half a dozen or more of the leading cities of the State.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eight acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

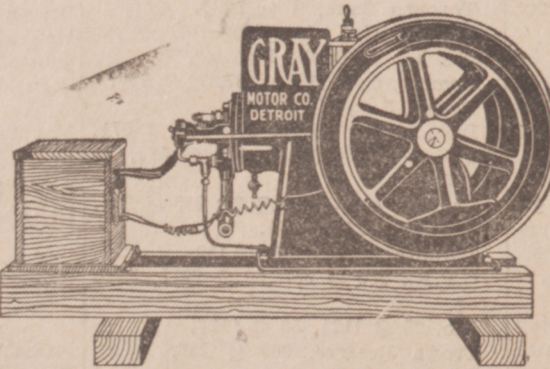
