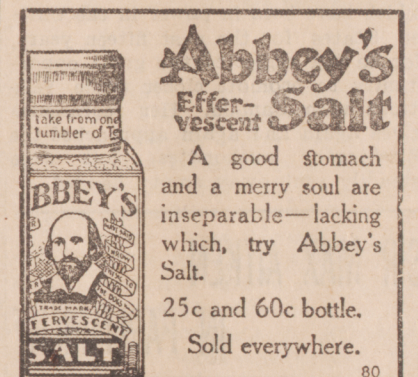

COMMISSION TO ARBITRATE LABOR DISPUTES

London, Sept. 26.—The government has decided to appoint a board of trade commission empowered to arbitrate labor disputes. The commission will consist of twelve commissioners, representing equally the employers and the employers, with Sir George R. Askwith, the well-known strike-breaker, as permanent chief. Sir George has represented the board of trade at the settlement of various strikes during the past year. The government will nominate the commissioners and are to secure men of judicial rather than of partisan type, but they will be trusted leaders. Thus on the men's side invitations have already been sent to Messrs. Thorne, Bowerman and Enoch Edwards. The scheme will be experimental for a year.

FATALLY INJURED BY SHELL EXPLOSION

(Canadian Press.)
 New York, Sept. 26.—Mrs. Anna Halpitt took a loaded one-pound shell from the mantle in her uptown home last night to use as a hammer in driving a bothersome tack out of the heel of her shoe. She struck the percussion cap in the base of the projectile and in the explosion, which followed, she received injuries which will probably result in her death. Mrs. Halpitt is a widow sixty years old. The shell which she seized for a hammer had lain on the mantle in her apartments for a number of years as a souvenir present from a friend.



DEFERRED ELECTIONS HELD IN QUEBEC

Quebec, Sept. 25.—In the Gaspé election today Dr. Gauthier, opposition defeated Lemieux, Liberal by 553 majority.

In Chicoutimi, Gerard, Liberal won by 1,200 majority.
 Winnipeg, Sept. 25.—There is absolutely no doubt that the Conservatives have eight and the Liberals two in Manitoba. With all results in the Liberals win Dauphin and retain Provencher. There will be a recount in Provencher that may give the seat to the Conservatives, but it is unlikely.

ATLANTA TO VOTE ON COMMISSION PLAN

Atlantic, Ga., Sept. 26.—Whether Atlanta shall adopt the commission form of municipal government or continue to be governed under the existing plan will be decided by the voters at a special election tomorrow. The campaign which closed today has been one of the most spirited in the history of the city. Both proposed change express confidence the advocates and opponents of the in the result of the election.

A WARM TRIBUTE PAID TO THE OLD BRIGADE

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Now that the election is won and there is no further need for extreme and unjustifiable criticism of the Liberal leaders, the Conservative press is paying in some instances generous tributes to the defeated. The Ottawa Journal, (Conservative), which led a very bitter campaign against the Government, now seeks to make amends. It said in part, editorially, yesterday: "No political leader ever went down to defeat more gallantly than Sir Wilfrid Laurier did this month. At the age of 70 he made a campaign which for vigor, eloquence and courage was a marvel. That sometimes his good temper failed him as it had never done before, was no wonder, in view of the peculiarly harassing nature of the contest to him. Subjected on one hand to attack because of being insufficiently British in sympathy, he was assailed on the other by the charge that he was aiming to butcher French-Canadian youth in British wars; and both extremes joined to denounce him as aiming to risk Canadian autonomy by his reciprocity proposition. Human nature would need to be angelic to be free from restiveness under such mixed prodding as all that."

"Mistaken in his indifference to the British sentiment of Canada, incompetent in big business questions such as the G.T. Pacific and the Quebec bridge, and deaf to the criticisms of the management of Government departments, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, nevertheless ranked and still ranks as a great Canadian and a great man. His grasp of constitutional principles his breadth of mind, his eloquence, courage and kindness, his personal honor and integrity, his political shrewdness and picturesqueness have justly made him a notable figure on the world's stage."

In regard to the defeated Ministers The Journal says:—"A good thing for Canada it would be if the eight Liberal Cabinet Ministers who fell in Thursday's battle could be in this Parliament in place of lesser men of their party. The exceptional ability and the great Parliamentary experience of Mr. Fielding, Mr. Graham and Mr. Fisher were very valuable assets to Canadian public life."

HUMOR OF THE LATE CAMPAIGN

(Telegraph)
 One of the ballot boxes at the polling station in Chatham was for electors the initials of whose surnames were any of three certain letters of the alphabet. During polling one of Mr. Morrison's most active and energetic stumpers and canvassers called in to vote. Having secured a ballot from the deputy returning officer he started towards the screen where ballot and lead pencil were placed for the use of voters. On the way he was seen by those in the booth to take his fountain pen from his vest pocket and, after marking his ballot, to return it thereto. He did not use any lead pencil.

When the ballot from that box was counted it was discovered that there was only one ballot found thereon which had been marked with an X in ink, and, lo, the X was opposite the name of Mr. Loggie. But there was not much consternation. It was only a confirmation of what had been freely predicted by many—both Conservatives and Liberals—of Chatham.

INHERITS TITLE AND FORTUNE

Lawton, Okla., Sept. 26.—W. Joseph Eldridge, who is working as a farm hand near here, today received word that he is heir to the title and fortune of the late Earl Myers of Craig Castle, near Glasgow, Scotland.

Eldridge saw service in the Boer War, in Egypt, and the Boxer uprising, as a lieutenant in the Eighteenth Hussars. He came to the United States and enlisted in the American army, where he rose to the rank of a non-commissioned officer. He was station at Fort Sill, Okla. Later he left the army to study farming.

P. E. O. MEETING IN ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 26.—St. Louis is entertaining this week a distinguished gathering of women visitors from all over the country, who have come to attend the national convention of the P. E. O. clubs. The organization which was first formed in 1869 at Iowa Wesleyan University, is the largest woman's secret society in the world. No one except members know what the letters P. E. O. mean. The initial session of the convention this afternoon was devoted to the exchange of greetings and the work of organization. Mrs. Winona E. Reeves of Keokuk, Iowa, the national president occupied the chair.

Sir Frederick Borden unquestionably possessed a valuable knowledge and keen interest in military affairs. Messrs Paterson, Templeman, King and Bureau each had qualifications to be especially useful in Parliament. The new House is the worse of the absence of such experienced public men so long as a sufficient majority on the other side insures a new executive regime on the hill.

The absence of Mr. Fielding and Mr. Graham must be particularly deplored. Both were of the finest type of Canadian public men. We doubt if Mr. Graham was much in sympathy with the reciprocity idea. He said comparatively little about it. That his heart is in the right place was illustrated by his splendid saying at the banquet of the Ottawa Board of Trade this year: "The Empire is my country; Canada is my home." Mr. Graham in office showed himself unspoiled by power; he retained the confidence of the country in his honesty, fairness and ability, and he increased its liking for himself personally by his good temper and kindly humor.

Mr. Fielding similarly leaves office with the absolute confidence in his integrity and personal clean ideals of the people of Canada. His political acumen was great; his first real mistake in fifteen years was the reciprocity proposition. To that we fancy he was predisposed by his long training in free trade ideas. We do not believe that prior to the opening of the debate in Parliament he ever dreamed that the reciprocity proposition could be supposed likely to seriously affect this country's political destiny. Mr. Fielding is a loyal Canadian.

"We do not suppose for an instant that any Minister or any Liberal who entered the recent contest on the reciprocity platform had any idea that the proposition was dangerous either to Canadian business independence or to British connection. The mistake was of judgment, not of any design to affect existing political conditions, though such, we believe (and the majority of the people of Canada have shown themselves to Canada have shown themselves to table result."
