Philadelphia, Sept. 25.—Money Melody, the New England welterweight, defeated Young Griffio tonight in their bout at the American A. C. In the initial round Melody sent the miner to the ropes with a left hook to the face and showed signs of his old time form. He staggered Griffio the fourth with a right to the jaw. Griffio sent in a left hook that opened up a scar over Melody's right eye.

Melody eluded Griffio's powerful swings in the fifth round. Melody knew too much for Griffio, and showed just enough class to outdistance his opponent.

In the final round Melody mixed it up and got in telling blows.

AMERICAN LEAGUE PENNANT

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 26.—The American League championship for 1911 was decided here today when Philadelphia defeated Detroit by the score of 11 to 5. It was the fourth time that a local team piloted by Connie Mack has won the pennant in this organization, and it was the first time that Philadelphia has won the title in successive seasons. By repeating this year the Philadelphia Phillies earned the right to defend the title of world's champions, which it won last year in a series with the Chicago National League Club.

Only two teams fought it out for the leading honors in the American League this season. Philadelphia and Detroit being the only teams that played strong. The latter got a flying start last spring and on May 19, the Tigers had a lead of 12 games over the home team. From that date the local team gained ground and it took the lead from Detroit for the first time on July 4. The next day, New York defeated Philadelphia and the latter dropped into second place. Detroit kept in front until Aug. 4, when Mack's team, for the second time, jumped into first place. Since then, Philadelphia has never been headed.

PANSY SILVER

RACED TO DEATH
AT COLUMBUS

Dudie Archdale, Miss Deforest and Oakdale the Winners—Track was Very Fast

Columbus, O., Sept. 25.—Dudie Archdale, Miss Deforest and Oakdale went winning races over that fast Columbus track this afternoon, where the inaugural program of the September independent meeting was presented before a small crowd. Another race was attempted but not finished. In it, the 2:20 pace, the day's best time was made when Ella M did the first mile in 2:04. The next two heats went elsewhere and the event had to go over.

Dudie Archdale, winner of the 2:07 trot, was favorite. Each mile was done in better than 2:07 and never did Charlie Mitchell of Tom Murphy's powerful stable crowd the little black mare enough to cause Driver Geers to settle down to work on her.

Pansy Silver was the first choice in the other trotting race, the 2:19, but did not live to finish the second mile. A contender in the first heat until a break put her out of it, this rough going mare started the next heat in good shape and waded through a close fourth at the half. There she choked up and slowed down to a staggering trot. Going to a break, she fell against the inside fence and rolled over it.

Driver Valentine, after warning drivers behind to pull wide, went over with the dying mare and was thrown clear of the pile without any injury whatever.

Last week at Detroit, Pansy Silver took a mark of 2:09 in a winning six-heat race, during which she ran away once.

SANDY FERGUSON

GETS SIX MONTHS
FOR WIFE-BEATING

Moncton Scrapper Became Sore when His Wife Complimented Sam Langford's Ability

Boston, Sept. 29.—John A. ("Sandy") Ferguson appeared in the superior criminal court yesterday not guilty in the case charging him with assault and battery upon his wife.

"You wish to attract your plea of not guilty and enter a plea of guilty?" asked the clerk.

"Yes, that's all right," replied Sandy.

"Sandy" was in the Chelsea police court some days ago. It was charged that he hit his wife with a frying pan. She received a cut on the face and her hand was also bruised. According to the testimony, the trouble began when "Sandy" complained about his supper. He became particularly angry, it is said, when she said something complimentary of Sam Langford's pugilistic ability.

In the Chelsea court Sandy was found guilty and appealed. Mrs. Ferguson went to the district attorney's office a couple of days after the alleged assault and requested that the whole thing be dropped. Yesterday she told the court that "Sandy" came home Sunday night and started a rough house. She says he kicked her and beat her. Ferguson was sentenced to six months in the house of correction.

Just before Sandy was brought from the detention room, he said to a prisoner awaiting sentence: "I'm going to get mine today; it's a ride down the harbor."

DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next. Further information can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Naval Service, Ottawa.
