SWITZERLAND HAS VIOLENT EARTHQUAKE

Berne, Switzerland, Nov. 17.—A violent earthquake was felt throughout Switzerland at 12.17 last night. This was followed by lesser quakes. The movement was especially strong in the cantons of Berne and Zurich, in the district of Interlaken and through the region of the Alps. So in Geneva, street cars were derailed in this city, and in Zurich theatre audiences were thrown into a panic and the audiences rushed into the streets. Many women fainted from fear. In the towns along the mountain slopes, the inhabitants fled from their homes and did not re-enter them until they were satisfied that the foundations of the houses were not seriously damaged.

PUNISHMENT METED OUT TO GERMAN CROWN PRINCE

Berlin, Nov. 17.—The Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm has been ordered to undergo a month's detention for his display of approval of criticism of the government's Moroccan policy, in the Reichstag on November 10.

TO ATTEND OPIUM CONFERENCE

New York, Nov. 18.—Among the passengers sailing for Europe today on the steamship Lapland, were several members of the United States delegation to the international opium congress which is to be held at The Hague next month. The party included Dr. Hamilton Wright of Maine and Henry J. Finger of California, who have been appointed delegates, together with the secretary, Fredric L. Huidekoper and the assistant secretary Wallace J. Young. Bishop Brent, the chairman of the delegation is now en route to The Hague from the Philippines. The purpose of the conference which will be attended by representatives of the leading nations, is to give effect to the resolutions of the international opium commission which met in Shanghai two years ago, and to endeavor to secure an agreement upon uniform national laws and regulations to control the production, manufacture and distribution of opium, its derivatives and preparations.

SIR WILFRID GOT IN SOME KEEN THRUSTS

A Halifax despatch to The Morning Chronicle gives the following report of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's remarks in the Commons on Wednesday on the motion to elect a speaker:

"When Sir Wilfrid rose his followers greeted him with resounding and long continued cheers. The Liberal leader spoke throughout with a characteristic play of good humor thoroughly enjoyed by his followers, but the government benches showed a manifest irritation over his delicate and good natured ironic touches.

THE BRITISH SYSTEM.

"It is," said he, "the privilege of every administration, after a general election, especially an administration with so large a majority as the present administration, to select an honorable gentleman to preside over this House. As an old friend and colleague of Dr. Sproule, I have no exception to take to what has been said in appreciation of him. But let me say in frankness, I have been surprised at the action of the government, having in view the very circumstances out of which the present administration came into office. In Britain, the mother of all parliaments, it is an established rule, though not a written one, that the speaker shall continue to hold office over successive parliaments. Much is to be said in favor of this system in preference to our own. An occupant of this great position is trained and gains valuable experience every year and every parliament. However much a man may possess in training and quality and education, there is still much more to be learned from experience."

SIR WILFRID'S PROPOSAL.

Proceeding, Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that when he had the honor to occupy the position now held by Mr. Borden, he had sought to institute the British system and in 1908 had communicated with Hon. Mr. Sutherland, who had been chosen speaker in 1904, urging him to continue in that position. He was, however, unable to accept and Hon. Mr. Maclellan had been appointed and held the position with increasing dignity, impartiality and ability. Sir Wilfrid had at that time communicated his position to the House and it had been apparently unanimously endorsed.

"Now," proceeded the Liberal leader, with a smile, "after an election in which the principle fought for by the victorious party was the maintenance of British institutions which were much threatened, it appears, by a harmless and innocent trade arrangement, I naturally felt assured that the head of the new government could hasten to put himself in accord with British precedent. (Liberal laughter and cheers.) But now that the victory is won, British institutions may of course, be relegated to the back yard in dust and to be brought out, polished and refurnished again when election comes around. (Heard, heard and renewed Liberal laughter.)

LOYALTY FOR ELECTION USE.

"Loyalty," continued Sir Wilfrid, "has always been made to serve the Conservative party in election times, but since the principle of British institutions and British precedent has been departed from already, it is perhaps, in the fitness of things that the honorable member from East Grey should be selected.

"I have nothing to say in exception to the choice. He and I are among the oldest members of the House and for more than thirty years we have been fellow-members continuously together. He is able, painstaking, hard-working and conscientious, according to his lights, although his lights are not my lights. The only weakness I have to find with him is that he is a Tory, a Tory of the Tories, the very quintessence of Toryism.

"I say this not in anger but in sorrow—deep sorrow—and I hope when he takes leave of the floor and ascends the three steps of the speaker's chair, he will leave his Toryism behind him and become the impartial servant of the House."

RAPS THE NATIONALISTS.

Continuing in this vein of good humored raillery, of which he is a good master, Sir Wilfrid added:

"But if I am surprised at an action which departs from British precedent, how much more must everybody be surprised that the selection made has received the endorsement of the minister of public works (Mr. Monk) and the coterie he represents, his fellow Nationalists in the government. If my honorable friend from East Grey had read the Nationalist press as carefully as I have done, he would know what a bad man he is. (Renewed Liberal laughter and cheering.) He would know that he is so bad that it is a crime for any one in the Liberal or the Nationalist party to vote with him on any division. Nay, more, he will learn that in 1905 there was a conspiracy between him and me to deprive the Catholic population of Al-

berta and Saskatchewan of their schools and the French settlers of their language. He will learn all this and much more, yet on this first day of the session, my honorable friend is chosen as the candidate of the Nationalist party.

"Sir, is it not this that we take the measure of what we are to believe of their denunciations and how easily they swallow their principles, if indeed they can be dignified by the name of principles?" (Prolonged Liberal cheering.)

MR. BORDEN WAS CROSS.

When Sir Wilfrid concluded there was an awkward pause as Mr. Borden rose, evidently nettled. The opposition leader, he complained crossly, had indulged in a more or less rambling speech, while admitting that Dr. Sproule was entirely worthy. He had already begun to give evidence that he was going to preach in opposition what he had not practised in power. His speech had evidenced surprise that "certain dissensions which he expected to see on this side of the House have not made themselves manifest." (Liberal laughter.)

Mr. Borden characterized the observations of the Liberal leader as "unworthy," and added "that it was no new thing in the political record of the right honorable gentleman." The premier concluded somewhat petulantly by challenging Sir Wilfrid to divide the House, if he had any doubt of the unanimity of the Conservative and Nationalist ranks.

Following the adoption of the motion, Dr. Sproule was escorted to the speaker's chair by Messrs. Borden and Foster and briefly expressed his appreciation of the honor done him.

"It will be my pleasure and my duty," he said, "to deal with all questions with firmness and impartiality."

The House then adjourned until Thursday afternoon.
