## SANE TOWN PLANNING

Hon. W. L. McKenzie (King, who was minister of Labor in the Laurier Government presided at a political meeting in Toronto a few nights ago and made a practical speech. Hon. Mr. King has made a close study of social and economic problems, and although he was speaking at a political meeting, he launched out on broad lines and people of all shades of politics will be inclined to agree with his remarks. Here is what he is reported to have said:

"The energies of government, cannot be better applied than in caring for the health and wellbeing of the masses of the people. Conservation of natural resources and increase of material wealth alone do not make a nation. We want to see the congested districts find no place in our country. We want to anticipate these by sane town planning, which will insure the health and strength of the generations to come. We must deal with the problem of rural depopulation.

"East London and the slums of Liverpool, of Glasgow, of Edinburgh, and Dublin are a worse menace to the United Kingdom than any foreign foe. Overcrowding in the tenements of New York and Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago, and the industrial conditions which surround the dwellers therein, are doing more to weaken the moral and physical fibre and to spread disease amongst the American nation than armies of social reformers and physicians will be able to eradicate for generations to come."

Speaking of prison reform Hon. Mr. King said it was good in its way, but he thought it far easier to reform conditions that produce criminals than it is to reform criminals after they are made.

The ex-Minister of Labor's utterances are those of a man who knows what he is talking about. They are based on sound common sense and should be heeded by people of every town and city in Canada. The present generation of citizens of Fredericton perhaps do not appreciate to the extent which they should the great debt which they owe to the men of the election days who planned and laid out the capital city of New Brunswick. Our broad, shaded streets are a source of wonder and admiration to all visitors, and there are few if any cities or towns in Canada that can hold a candle to Fredericton in this regard. Fredericton was a city when Indians and buffaloes had thinned pretty much all their own way on the western prairies, and although the people of the flourishing cities which have since sprung up in that section of the country had the benefit of modern ideas and can beat us out in the use of the bellows, we have little or nothing to learn from them in the matter of town planning. In this respect Fredericton is in a class by itself, and thankful we should be to the men of the past who planned so wisely and took steps to insure the health and strength of the generations to come."

Mr. Arthur Hawkes, alias John V. Borne who worked the British Borne gag during the recent election has already been rewarded by the Tory government for his services. Some pointed questions in regard to this individual have been placed on the order paper at Ottawa by Liberal members

Here is a sample brick from a speech delivered during the Drummond-Arthabaska campaign by Mr. Albert Bevilacqua, M. P., for Dorchester, the Nationalist selected by Premier Borden to second the address in reply to the speech from the throne:

"The [Laurier] Cabinet is a Cabinet of Imperialists who want to sacrifice Canada's interests to plunge us into wars with which we have nothing to do. The Naval Bill is an attempt on the part of Ontario, and the provinces of the West to Coerce Quebec and enslave our people forever. What has England done for you. She has no need of your help. She is strong enough to defend herself. Laurier's ideal is to make you, the vassals of the majority of the West, who have by treaty robbed us of our rights in the past. You must protest by your votes against this slave traffic. You must protest against helping England in her wars; unless you do, conscription will come next."

Commodore Stewart of the Chatham World rises to remark:

"The Celestial City must be an ideal resort for anybody who wants to get good without cash. Any lady visitor might walk into one of its big stores and say, 'I'm Mrs. J. Fred. Benson, or Mrs. J. L. Stewart, of Chatham, I'll take a fur coat and you can charge it,' and no questions would be asked."

Fredericton merchants may be easy and they may get their share of blocks, but the Commodore is certainly going the limit when he intimates that they can be taken in by the wife of a crusty old bachelor. Any North Shore woman with sufficient nerve to come to Fredericton and palm herself off as the wife of Commodore Stewart would not need to wear a hobble skirt to become an object of great interest.

Hon. Charles Murphy will ask Premier Borden if Mr. Monk's statement that he was allowed to select his own colleagues from Quebec is correct and if a similar privilege was accorded to any other member of the government.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley has a rather knotty question on the order paper at Ottawa for Premier Borden. He wants to know about that promise of harbor improvements which the Premier made to the electors of St. John on the eve of the election.

One of the questions which the Liberals have on the order paper at Ottawa asks if the statement in a Quebec paper that Premier Borden recently paid homage to Archbishop Beggs was founded on fact.

The Orangemen of York will be interested in knowing that Speaker Sproule has started to learn French and intends to offer prayers in that language once a week.

Although the Naval question was not mentioned in the speech from the throne, Premier Borden will find that the ghost will not go down.

VALLEY RAILWAY NEGOTIATIONS  
MAKING HASTE SLOWLY

Following is the record to date of Premier Fleming's negotiations with the Borden government in re the St. John Valley Railway:

Nov. 3.—Premier Fleming states in a speech at the Woodstock banquet that he is going to Ottawa on business connected with the St. John Valley Railway and will remain there until the question is settled. Here are the exact words he used: "I am going to Ottawa next week and I am going to stay there until I bring it back with me."

Nov. 11.—Premier Fleming starts for Ottawa accompanied by Mrs. Fleming.

Grading of course, must be discontinued, as soon as the frost hardens the ground, but the company propose to keep all its gang at work throughout the cold weather, clearing right of way and making cuts through the mountain.

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
