## County Council Wants Hard Labor for Tramps and Vagrants

Passed Resolution Yesterday Requesting Police Magistrate Marsh to Refrain From Giving Tramps Time to Get Out of Town--Council Refuses to Increase Grant to Victoria Hospital.

The County Council at Wednesday afternoon session voted the usual grant of \$500 to the Victoria Hospital. A strong minority wished to increase the grant by \$200, but the majority favored the continuation of the former grant. The tramp problem also received considerable attention, the council finally passing a resolution requesting Police Magistrate Marsh to refrain in the future from giving vagrants arrested in Fredericton the opportunity of leaving the city within a certain length of time. The councillors were of the opinion that such action on the part of the Police Magistrate amounted to the dumping of undesirable characters on country districts which are without police protection. Imprisonment with hard labor was the remedy advised for the tramp nuisance and the establishment of a chain-gang in connection with the county jail was advocated. The report of the Board of Health was also received and adopted. Officers for several parishes were appointed and the assessments of several parishes fixed.

### HOSPITAL MATTERS

When business was resumed at three o'clock Warden Rogers presented to the council a statement showing the number of free patients from the county treated at the Victoria Hospital during 1910 and the parishes from which they came.

The statement was as follows:—Douglas, 7; Kingsclear, 3; St. Mary's, 9; Stanley, 3; Canterbury, 3. Total 25. Total number of day's treatment 320.

After some discussion the matter of the grant to the hospital was taken up.

Coun. Sterling seconded by Coun. Skene moved that the grant of \$500 be continued and that a supplementary grant of \$200 be given.

In amendment Coun. Carson seconded by Coun. Morrison moved that the grant of \$500 be continued.

Coun. Reynolds moved in amendment to the amendment that the grant of \$500 be continued and a supplementary grant of \$250 be given. There was no seconder for this amendment.

Coun. F. Pond, speaking to the amendment, presented some statistics concerning the Victoria Hospital, claiming that the cost of maintenance of free patients was excessive. York County paid one dollar per day for its patients in 1910. During the year the hospital had a surplus of \$940.00, which was very good, he thought. The present grant of \$500 was sufficient. A supplementary grant was needed, let it be voted in July next.

Coun. Sterling—"We will have to assess for it now."

Coun. Colter said that Victoria Hospital was an institution of which all should be proud. During the past year the grant to the hospital had been about one cent per month from each ratepayer. The supplementary grant would increase the rate per head to one cent and a quarter. Surely British subjects living in the twentieth century could pay that for a first-class hospital. As far as the Parish of Douglas was concerned, it had received good value from the institution.

### COUN. STERLING.

Coun. Sterling called attention to the fact that the warrant for 1910 was \$900 less than that for 1895, also that this was the first instance in the experience of those present that there was not an item on the warrant for interest on debentures. They had all been paid off. He thought

the event might be celebrated by voting an increased grant to Victoria Hospital.

Coun. Timmins opposed any increase in the grant on the ground that the ratepayers did not favor it. The amendment for a grant of \$500 was carried.

### SCOTT ACT RECEIPTS.

The secretary presented the report of receipts from the police magistrate from Scott Act fines. The report was referred to the Scott Act Committee.

Coun. F. Pond submitted the report of the Administration of Justice Committee, which was received and adopted.

### BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT.

Chairman Smith of the Board of Health, on the motion of Coun. Timmins, presented his report. The report stated that reports from physicians were not regular. Diphtheria and scarlet fever in Health District No. 3 had been prevalent during the year. In fourteen cases of diphtheria one death occurred. One death occurred from scarlet fever. The general health of the other districts had been good. There had been eighteen cases of diphtheria at McAdam.

Chairman Smith reported a favorable balance of \$133.44. He asked for a grant of \$400, the same as that of the previous year. He stated that there had been some complaint because he did not have a telephone. If the county desired to place a telephone in his home he had no objections. (Laughter.)

On the motion of Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Everett, the report was received and referred to the Council.

### NEW MEMBERS OF BOARD.

Ex-Coun. Alex. Brewer, of Douglas, on the motion of Coun. Colter, was appointed a member of the Board of Health in succession to Hon. G. J. Colter.

Dr. P. E. Butler, of McAdam, was elected a member of the Board of Health on the motion of Coun. Skene, in succession to George J. Green.

### FERRY LICENSES.

Coun. Grant, seconded by Coun. Depow, moved a resolution that a license to operate a wire-ferry at Meductic be given George Porter. Carried.

On the motion of Coun. Carson, seconded by Coun. Gilman, a license was issued to Robert Scott to operate a ferry at Dumfries.

### PUBLIC BUILDINGS REPORT.

Coun. Haining presented following report of the Public Buildings Committee.

To the Warden and County Council of the Municipality of York:

Your Committee on Public Buildings beg to report that, during the past year, your Committee have carefully attended to the duties entrusted to their care, and we feel that this Council is glad that our public buildings have been maintained and necessary improvements have been made so that these important buildings continue to be a credit to the county, and to be the cause of judges holding courts, complimenting the county on the fine condition of the buildings.

During the year the chimneys of the Court House were repaired, and a new furnace procured for the Court House.

Under the health regulations, and the Act of Assembly relating to City

sewerage, it was necessary to make connections with the sewerage system, both at the Court House and the gaol. It was also necessary to put in a new water service pipe at the Court House; also some mason work done at gaol.

All repairs that the Committee deemed necessary for the county buildings have been done.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The report was received and adopted on the motion of Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Grant.

### THE TRAMP QUESTION.

Coun. Timmins raised objection to the practice of Police Magistrate Marsh of giving vagrants, arrested in the city, two hours or less to leave the city. It meant that that class of people were cast upon the people of the county. The county paid two-thirds of the cost of maintenance of the jail. Why could tramps and similar characters not be sent to jail? He thought something should be done to remedy that state of affairs.

Coun. C. W. Pond expressed a similar opinion.

### WANTS BY-LAW.

Coun. Essena asked the county secretary for an opinion on the right of the County Council to pass a by-law governing the matter.

County Secretary Bliss said that no by-law could be passed by the County Council, but that a resolution on the matter could be passed, by which the police magistrate of Fredericton could be asked to refrain from sending tramps out into the country.

In response to Coun. Colter, the County Secretary said that the legislature, in his opinion, would not pass any law to compel the police magistrate to send vagrants to jail.

### WORKHOUSE ADVOCATED.

Coun. Essena said that the threat of the police magistrate against tramps amounted to a sentence.

Coun. C. W. Pond advocated the establishment of a workhouse as a means to abate the tramp nuisance. Coun. Robt. Graham thought that penitentiary was the place for the tramps.

Coun. Fred Pond said he was surprised to hear of the councillors complaining of tramps. He thought none got further than Gibson and St. Mary's. The city of Fredericton could get something out of the tramps by putting them in a chain-gang and making them break stone.

Coun. Everett said that all tramps did not go to St. Mary's and Gibson. In the last haying season three had appeared in Kingsclear and done considerable damage before being arrested by the deputy sheriff.

### RESOLUTION PASSED

On motion of Coun. Fred Pond, seconded by Coun. McMullin, it was decided to forward to Police Magistrate Marsh a resolution asking him to discontinue the practice of sending tramps out into the country.

### REPORT OF PRINTING COMMITTEE

Coun. Everett presented the report of the Printing Committee, which was received and adopted.

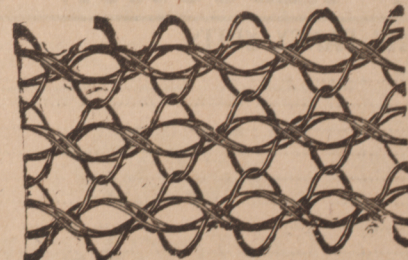
