LAMY DEFEATED

FOR FIRST TIME,
McLEAN WINNER

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 18.—Edmund Lamy, of Saranac Lake, N. Y., amateur champion ice skater of the world, was defeated here tonight for the first time in his career by Robert McLean, of Chicago. In a three-quarter mile race, the principal event in the annual national championship amateur tourney, McLean shot to the winning post a bare stride ahead of Lamy. Two other races were run, both being won by the New York skater. Summaries:

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 18.—Showing greatly improved form, Jack Lester, Tommy Burns' "white man's hope," knocked out Pete Muldoon, a clever Seattle middleweight, in the third round of a scheduled 10-round go before a crowd of 4000 here last night.

Muldoon was put out with a terrific swing to the neck, early in the third round. In this session Muldoon threw Lester through the ropes. Jack came back and spilled Muldoon for the count of nine with a left uppercut and ten seconds after he arose he knocked him out cold. Lester fights "Denver" Ed Martin next month.

DISORGANIZED FREDERICTON TEAM
ALMOST MADE ST. JOHN PLAY OVERTIME

Score Was 3 to 3 at Half-Time---St. John Won Out in Last Few Minutes of Play---Titus in Goal Opened Eyes of St. John Fans---Fredericton Plays in Sussex Tonight.

CONDITION WON

Concerning last night's game at St. John Manager Smith of the Fredericton team says:—"Condition won the game for St. John. The team Fredericton had on the ice could have won if it could have stood the pace we will beat St. John in Fredericton. The St. John players are the best stick handlers in the league and a gentlemanly lot. Tart Titus did great work in the net and the crowd gave him great cheers."

Fredericton met its first defeat in the N. B. H. L. last night, when the St. John team won from the locals by the score of 5 to 3. Fredericton had St. John guessing from the start Galloway and Duncan both scoring before a St. John tally was made. The first half ended with the score 3 to 3 and the winter port team barely squeezed out a victory in the last few minutes of the play, Gilbert and Clawson scoring before time expired.

Lack of condition was the main reason why Fredericton lost the forwards particularly showing inability to stand the pace.

Jack Feeney played a great game, but got few chances to score while the other forwards were good in spots, but played no combination. This was mainly on account of the disorganized condition of the forward line.

Galloway was shifted from rover to right wing, and Jack Gibson, of last

year's U. N. B. septette, was put in at rover, although he was in no condition to play.

The defence was the strong part of the Red and White team, Babbitt and Titus being particularly effective. The team plays Sussex tonight, completing the present tour there.

PRESS COMMENT

Concerning the game the St. John Standard says:

"With good fast ice and speedy players about 700 people witnessed the best game of hockey here this season, at the Queens rink, last evening, when in the provincial league series the St. Johns defeated the Fredericton seven by a score of 5 to 3. This makes three straight wins for the St. Johns and the first defeat for the Capitals."

"There was considerable offside play during the game, and the Referee, Roland Skinner, was kept busy. "There was considerable tripping by the visiting players and McAvity the home team's point, was given a few minutes' rest for the same tactics."

"At the early part of the second half, Gibson, of the Frederictons, was checked by Philps and he retali-

ated by slashing Philps over the back with his stick. For this action he was given a few minutes out of the game."

FREDERICTON STARTED WELL

The St. John Telegraph says:—"Fredericton started out very auspiciously and soon led 2 to 0. The first goal was batted in by Galloway from a mix-up and a few minutes later, Duncan went in on the St. John net and scored while the local defense stood and watched him perform the trick. This aroused the World-Beaters, and Philps pulled off a couple of runs that brought the crowd to its feet, but could not beat Titus. This gent, by the way, gave an exhibition of goal-tending rarely seen in this city. Time after time he rushed away out of his net and blocked what looked like certain scores. Philps would go onto him, then McAvity would sweep down like a falcon and Clawson and his forwards would bombard him, but he turned them all aside until near the finish, when they came too fast. He, with Babbitt, made a defence hard to get through. The visitors' defense had it on the locals in blocking and breaking up plays, but neither Babbitt nor Sterling can follow Philps or McAvity when it comes to rushing or stick work. The St. John line is undoubtedly faster and stronger than the team from the capital, but last night they were not working together at all. In their game with Sussex they showed far better form and will have to take the measure of the red and white in Fredericton."

"Clawson, Philps and Gilbert were pretty near the whole show for the

locals. Pierce in goal, turned aside many shots, but he did not begin to have at many as Titus had poured in on him. For Fredericton their defence was about two-thirds of the team. The forwards seem to be new at the game, but they know how to get in the way, and have a lucky faculty of breaking up a run by a random poke at the rubber. The local's forwards, in anything like form, would go through them like an electric drill through a bag of beans. They only hit their true pace in the last few minutes of play last night and when they did the visitors were swept off their feet."
