Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 18.—Edmund Lamy, of Saranac Lake, N. Y., amateur champion ice skater of the world, was defeated here tonight for the first time in his career by Robert McLean, of Chicago. In a three-quarter mile race, the principal event in the annual national championship amateur tourney, McLean shot to the winning post a bare stride ahead, of Lamy.
