OTTAWA WON BY AGGRESSIVE PLAY BY THE FORWARDS

Canadians Although Disorganized Put up Good Game--Redpath Starred for Victorious Team.

Montreal Jan. 2--Ottawa defeated Canadiens in the opening game of the National Association Saturday night before the largest gathering that has ever witnessed a hockey inaugural here. Ottawa won out by a score of 5 to 3. The attendance was close to six thousand, a crowd of Stanley Cup proportions.

Ottawa went out by ability to bore in on the nets and take advantages of openings offered. Canadiens lacked system in attack, shot badly and in addition were loose in defence. The game was played under the new rule calling for three periods of twenty minutes each, with a rest of ten minutes between. The innovation was apparently a success, the play being faster and better sustained in interest than under the old twenty-minute periods.

Ottawa secured the first goal of the match in ten minutes, directly as a result of a misplay by the Canadiens point, who threw the puck out of a scrimmage with his hand, giving Ottawa a face on the goal line, from which Redpath immediately tallied.

The first period score was 2 to 1 for the Canadiens. In the second each team scored once, making it 3 to 2 for the French seven with the match two-thirds over.

Just before the end of the second period Poulin was ruled off for ten minutes for throwing his stick at the puck as Walsh dashed in alone on the Canadiens goal. Ottawa as a result of these penalties had the advantage of an odd man for the first eight minutes of the third period, and turned the advantage to good purpose. Darragh who had been substituted for Gaul evened the score at 3 to 3 in three minutes and Walsh put Ottawa in the lead at 4 to 3 in three minutes. A goal for Redpath four minutes later clinched the result, and there was no further scoring. Canadiens had it on Ottawa in everything at the finish but could not find the nets.

MIKE TWIN SULLIVAN IN DRAW WITH LOUGHREY

Buffalo, Jan. 3--Mike ("Twin") Sullivan of Boston and Young Loughrey of Philadelphia boxed a slow 10-round bout before members of the International A. C. here tonight. No decision was given, but the consensus of opinion was that honors were about even.

Barring the last round when the men mixed it, the contest was slow and uninteresting. Sullivan looked to have 15 pounds on his opponent, who tired near the end, but Mike was not there with the necessary punch to settle the question.

It was a question with Loughrey whether or not he would go on, up to a few minutes before the start. He became ill with a stomach disorder this afternoon and did not think that he would be able to box.

Both the contestants lacked force in their blows. Loughrey kept boring in on his antagonist, but Mike was careful and took good care of his stomach in the clinches. Time and again he had a chance to send Loughrey down for the count but his blows were very weak.

In the 10th he went after his man but Loughrey swapped punches with him until the bell ended the contest. Brooklyn Tommy Murphy and Young McGlynn boxed an eight-round preliminary, which was full of action from start to finish. It was even up.

ENGLISH BANTAM-WEIGHT MAKES GOOD START

New York, N. Y., Jan. 3.--Sammy Kellar, the young English bantam-weight boxer, began the new year auspiciously by a victory yesterday afternoon, fairly smothering Young Joe Shugre in a 10 round bout at the Olympic A. C. In the words of a habitue, young Shugre "never was in it." Kellar had the better of his adversary in 8 of the 10 rounds, and the best Shugre could do was to even up the other two rounds, the fourth and the eighth.

CON O'KELLEY, WHITE MAN'S HOPE SHOWED POORLY

Jeff Madden Battered Him at Will--Aspirant for Championship Showed Little Knowledge of Boxing.

New Bedford, Jan 3--More than 3,000 persons saw the bout at the Elm rink last night between Con O'Kelley, one of the "white man's hope" brigade and Jeff Madden.

It was for 12 rounds and was a fast bout, with Madden having the better of it all the way; but as both men were on their feet at the end of the 12th round Referee Downey called it a draw.

The fact that Tommy Ryan was behind O'Kelley gave the spectators some hope that O'Kelley would be a good match for Madden, but it cannot be said that he was, excepting in staying qualities. O'Kelley is a big husky man and 30 pounds heavier than Madden.

Madden did a good deal of the leading because O'Kelley has not yet reached the part of the game where he can do so scientifically. When he did lead and played for Madden's body with a right punch, which was about all the lead he knew, Madden came back with a right hook to O'Kelley's face.

In the fourth round he cut O'Kelley over the left eye and during the rest of the bout that eye was bleeding continuously, Madden seeming to hit O'Kelley there at will, the latter having a poor defence on this side.

O'Kelley got in some smashing left and right punches, but excepting in the 10th round, when one hard right swing knocked Madden to the floor for the count of five, Madden took the heavy blows and came back strong. Madden got in some clever left and right uppercuts that staggered O'Kelley.

AMERICAN COLLEGE WOI AT ENGLISH RUGBY

Vancouver B. C. Jan 2--By a score of 22 to 0 Stanford University Rugby team won the second game of the expedition series with Vancouver at Brookton Point Saturday afternoon before a good attendance of enthusiasts.

The collegians secured two goals and four tries Vancouver failing to cross the visitors' line during the afternoon. Only the hardest kind of misfortune prevented Stanford from winning by a larger score, and they nearly earned a victory by a more decisive marking. The Vancouver team which opposed the Cardinal today was a patched-up aggregation, five of the players who took part in last Monday's game being unable to play on account of injuries. All the scoring was done in the first half.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
