SIR WILFRID'S SPEECH

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's onslaught on the Nationalist-Tory combine which now sits in the Treasury Benches at Ottawa should be an encouragement not only to every Canadian Liberal, but to every citizen of the Dominion for it assures the country that the party now in opposition in the Dominion House of Commons is possessed of a leader who can lead his forces as brilliantly after a defeat as after a victory. The effort of the silver-haired chieftain who has just passed the seventieth milestone of his life is most inspiring and is of tremendous value inasmuch that it has forced the Conservative leader at the outset of his premiership to acknowledge that the iniquitous pact between Conservative and Nationalist has borne its fruit and a disloyal minority compelled a party numerically powerful and but recently emerged victorious from a struggle at the polls, to abandon a naval policy that was truly Canadian and which at one time was endorsed by that party's leader.

The present session of the Parliament of Canada has opened in such a manner as to make almost certain a very lively period in Dominion politics. The opposition has shown even at this early stage, that it has strength which it will use to the advantage of the country and the party supporting the government has already exhibited signs of divergence of opinion on the part of those forming its two prominent sections. News from Ottawa for the next few months will have an interest to the public that will be tremendous.

A LIVE ONE" WANTED

The Toronto Telegram has not a very high opinion of the business capacity of Mr. Borden's Minister of Railways. This is that good Tory journal's indictment of his administration as a member of the Ontario Government:

"The late Hon. Rip Van Winkle slept for twenty years amid the peaks of the Catskill Mountains, and was offered nothing but a cold potato when he woke up.

"The living Hon. Frank Cochrane slept for six and a half years amid the possibilities of the Temiskaming country, and was made first Minister from Ontario when he was translated without ever waking up.

"Ontario is not entitled to indict the Cochrane administration on the complaint that the prospector or miner is not in the North. The prospector was sure to get there, the gold hunter could not be kept away. The deep damnation of Hon. Frank Cochrane's showing after six and a half years of supremacy is that the priceless man, the farmer, Mr. Cochrane has never put there on fertile acres that will be glorious with farms when gold is no more and silver is forgotten."

It is to be hoped that Mr. Cochrane will wake up shortly.

We wish to call the special attention of our Flag-Flapping friends to the patronizing yet very firm attitude which Mr. Bourassa adopts towards them and Mr. Borden. Mr. Bourassa is not quite certain whether Mr. Borden really understood what he was saying when he suggested Imperial Reciprocity, in his Halifax address; but Mr. Bourassa has no doubt at all that Mr. Borden was talking unmitigated nonsense, whether he knew it or not; and he tells him so in the plainest possible words.

policy would be dropped. The naval policy which affected for all time to come the relations of Canada with the rest of the empire should be thrashed out and debated before the people and they should be given the opportunity of pronouncing upon it. "We shall take pains to learn in the meantime what are the conditions confronting the empire and shall be prepared to do our duty as citizens of the empire."

HUGH GUTHRIE

Hugh Guthrie, following, said that Finance Minister White had declared he entered the government through the open door. The door was not always open. It was opened for him by a battering ram in the hands of the trusts and special interests, and Mr. White sat in the house today as the representative of trusts, mergers and financial interests.

Mr. Guthrie offered to Mr. Borden the support of the Liberals to stamp out the dangerous movement of Nationalism in the province of Quebec.

Mr. Foster was the last speaker. He was asked what was the government's policy on the naval question, and answered by asking what was the Liberal policy on reciprocity.

The adjournment of the debate was moved by F. B. Carvell.

The loss sustained in fire is estimated as being upwards of \$2,000 and is partially covered by insurance.

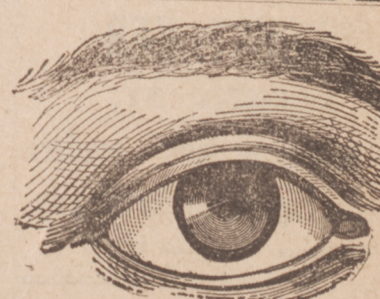
