## Marysville Visited by Disastrous Fire Sunday

Methodist Church and Residence of W. T. Day Totally Destroyed--Damage Estimated at \$70,000--Church One of Finest Sacred Edifices in Province--Insured for \$10,000.

The handsome Methodist Church at Marysville, which was one of the finest sacred edifices of the province and a tangible evidence of the generosity of Mr. Alex. Gibson Sr., was converted into smoking ruins within two hours yesterday afternoon. The fire began at about one o'clock. One hour and a half later the lofty spire of the church fell. Previous to that the flames had been communicated to the residence of Mr. W. T. Day, principal of the Marysville school, situated a short distance north of the church. The house which was the property of the Alex. Gibson Manufacturing Company was totally destroyed. Mr. Day was able to save a portion of his furniture. The destruction of the church by a curious

pulpit, ten in the gallery and a chandelier in the centre with twenty-four branches. The pews were carpeted and cushioned throughout. The first pulpit Bible was a very fine one and was presented to the church by the late Isaac Burpee, M. P., of St. John. At the time of its erection artists were brought here to paint the interior decorations. Chief among them was a German named Kuyler. The average cost of the stained glass windows was \$1,500. The building was of wood and with its lofty spire was a landmark for miles around.

### ORIGIN OF FIRE UNKNOWN

The origin of the fire is unknown. The flues and furnace had been inspected but a few weeks ago and

and the use of the Orange Hall has also been offered.

### OTHER FACTS.

The Marysville correspondent of The Mail writes as follows:

Marysville, January 30.—The Methodist Church, which was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday, was one of the finest in the Province. It was situated on an elevation and could be seen from a considerable distance. The exterior was of a material, being painted white with a dome-shaped roof with cupola and tall spire. The interior was very handsome, being finished in hardwood. The decorative painting was done by French and Italian artists. The magnificent pipe-organ was installed by Hooke & Hastings, of New York and was in the church when it was dedicated in 1873. Prof. Max Sterne at present living in Amherst, was the first organist and received a salary of \$1,500 a year from Mr. Alex. Gibson, Sr., who also built the church at a cost of \$66,000. Letter-covered bibles and hymn-books were provided free of cost for the worshippers. The beautiful stained glass windows were made especially for the church in England. The clergymen at the time of the dedication were Rev. Robt. Wilson, now superannuated and living in St. John. The following are the clergymen who have been stationed here: Rev. Robt. Wilson, Rev. Robt. Duncan, Rev. Edwin Evans, Rev. G. Lellars, Rev. W. W. Lo're, Rev. Dr. Sprague, Rev. Douglas Chapman, Rev. Wm. Lawson, Rev. Robt. Crisp, Rev. John Read, Rev. W. W. Brewer, Rev. W. B. Thomas, Rev. J. C. Berrie.

The officers at present are: W. Temple Day, circuit steward; Dr. Bayard Fisher, superintendent of Sabbath school and Rev. J. C. Berrie. A singular coincidence is that the church was dedicated thirty-eight years ago on the day it was burned. It was insured for \$10,000. One unusual feature in connection with the church was that there has never been any collections taken up at the Sun-

Coincidence occurred on the thirtieth anniversary of its dedication. At the time it was built the church cost about \$66,000. The dwelling house which was also destroyed is valued at \$2,000. The total loss is in the neighborhood of \$70,000. The church building was insured for \$10,000 and the dwelling house for \$800 in the Guardian Fire Insurance Company. Mr. Day carried \$1,000 on his furniture.

### DEDICATED IN 1873

Mr. Alex. Gibson Sr., founder and builder of the town of Marysville, erected the church at his own expense and presented it to the Methodists of Marysville.

The church was dedicated in 1873, among those taking part in the opening services being Rev. D. D. Currie, Rev. Hezekiah McKeown and Rev. Leonard Gaetz. Rev. Robert Wilson, D. D., was the first pastor.

### THE PASTORS

The following have in turn served as pastors of the church: Revs. Dr. Wilson, Robert Duncan, W. W. Brewer, Edwin Evans, John Read, D. Chapman, W. W. Lodge, W. W. Brewer, Wm. Lawson, Robert S. Crisp, W. B. Thomas, J. C. Berrie.

### DESCRIPTION

The building was gothic in style, octagonal in form with a spacious lecture room in front and lecture room in the rear, the whole being surmounted by a steeple and dome. The stucco work was fine and the frescoing elaborate. The ground work of the ceiling was sky blue studded with golden stars. The windows were of the best English stained glass scolloped with texts of scripture.

The pulpit was under a triple arch, the centre one of which bore the words, "Lead me to the Rock that is higher than I." The gallery was reserved for the choir who sat above the organ, which in the opinion of many competent judges was a very superior instrument. The lighting apparatus consisted of six lamps in the


and been found to be in good condition. Rev. J. C. Berrie, pastor of the church left the building at 12.45 just after morning service. At that time there were no signs of fire. Shortly after one o'clock smoke was observed issuing from around the chimney. Mrs. W. T. Day, Dr. E. B. Fisher and others saw that smoke at practically the same time. People ran to the church from different parts of the town, but were powerless to do anything toward stopping the fire. The interior of the church being filled with smoke which soon burst from the windows and was followed by the flames. News of the fire spread to Fredericton and large numbers of people went to Marysville to witness the destruction of the church.

### FIRE SPREADS.

At first it was thought that the flames would not spread to the residence of Mr. Day, but in a short time that house caught fire. A portion of the furniture was saved, but a piano and other heavy articles of furniture were burned in the house. Mrs. J. C. Christie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Day, who lost heavily in the fire at Campbellton last summer, was living with her parents and thus had the unenviable experience of being twice driven from home by fire within a few months. The fear that the spire of the church would fall on Mr. Day's house prevented the salvage of his household effects, except in the early stages of the fire. The spire fell at about 2.30.

### LOSS KEENLY FELT.

The loss of the church is keenly felt by the Methodists of Marysville and vicinity, but most keenly by Mr. Alex. Gibson, Sr., who presented it to his co-religionists. The Methodist congregation will hold a meeting early this week for the purpose of deciding on the action to be taken toward rebuilding. The trustees of the United Baptist Church of Marysville have offered the use of their church to the stricken congregation.

day services until within the last few years. The church will be much missed, as it was an object of interest to visitors from far and near, and it certainly was a monument to the liberality of Alex. Gibson. The house adjoining, occupied by Mr. W. T. Day and family, was also destroyed by fire. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Day, who was in Campbellton at the time of the fire which destroyed the home of her daughter, Mrs. John C. Christie.
