
GIVE ST. JOHN TEAM

FRANKIE BURNS HAD THE BETTER OF DIGGER STANLEY

No Decision Given But Burns the Favorite -- Englishman Showed Very Clever Footwork.

New York, Jan. 28--Frankie Burns of Jersey City outfought and out-pointed Digger Stanley, England's bantamweight champion, in a snappy 10-round bout before the National sporting club of America last night.

The British champion had the advantage of height and reach, and in the clinches used the kidney blow with some effect. He was inclined to wrestle, however, and was eventually worn down by Burns' body blows and infighting.

Burns had the better of the start and began his body-blow tactics in the first round, whereas Stanley swung rather wildly for the dead. In the second round Stanley sent a left and a right to the head and a left to the body, and had a shade the better of the round.

Burns' savage infighting in the third gave him all the better of the round, and Stanley's holding kept the referee busy. The Briton showed to better advantage in the fourth. He did most of the leading, but his blows were ineffective.

Burns put up hard rights to the stomach in the fifth, but Stanley escaped serious damage by clever footwork. He was fast on his feet in the sixth, also.

In the seventh Burns forced the fight, sending blows to the head and body with telling effect. Stanley tried for the head several times in the eighth, but generally missed. Burns continued to hammer the Englishman's body, but he covered up by clinching.

In the ninth Burns' lefts and rights to the body got Stanley tottering until he lay over upon Burns, and the referee had to drag him off.

Both entered the ring full of fight for the final round. In a break from a clinch Burns received a blow to the shoulder which sent him to the ropes but he was soon back and infighting.

While no decisions are allowed here the popular victory went to Burns almost unanimously. Both weighed in at 117 pounds.

ED. GEERS PASSES SIXTIETH BIRTHDAY

Memphis Jan. 28--Although he received many congratulations, telegrams and letters as well as other reminders of the feelings entertained by his friends for his welfare, Ed Geers, the veteran driver and trainer of harness horses put in most of his birthday yesterday, his 60th, in a "banquet" to his young and old trotters and pacers.

The Hgrvester and other famous heroes of the Grand circuit were given their annual spread of vegetables, including carrots, sugar beets and other delicacies, at the winter headquarters of Geers here.

FRED MITCHELL NOW IN SHOW BUSINESS

Fred Mitchell, who did fine work behind the bat for the New York Highlanders last year, has launched into the show business, with Toby Lyons, the old umpire, as the headliner. The troupe is appearing in the live towns of New England.

Mitchell is a Brighton boy, and did his first major league work for the Boston American as a pitcher. Wanting more work, he became a catcher for the Toronto club, and last season he did fine work for the New York Highlanders.

OTTAWA TRIMMED WANDERERS 8 TO 2

Montreal, Jan. 29--At the Arena on Saturday evening, Ottawa beat the Wanderers by 8 goals to 2, after one of the most exciting hockey matches ever witnessed in Montreal. Ten minutes before time the score was 2 all, but with two of the home team players penalized Ottawa added six goals in quick succession.

SNOWSTORM COMPELS POSTPONEMENT OF RACES

MONCTON AFTER WALTER SMAIL AND ART ROSS

Plays New Glasgow Tonight--Out to Beat Halifax at Any Cost--Nichols With Them.

Truro, Jan. 29--With every man in the pink of condition and determined to score a victory over New Glasgow at the Nova Scotia town Monday night, the Moncton professional hockey team arrived in Truro and are registered at the Learmont.

The aggregation of puck chasers from New Brunswick have been strengthened by Sibby Nichols, spare man of the Montreal Wanderers. The new recruit will be played at centre. With Scott going to rover and Crockett and Kennedy on the wings, Dorgan Brown and Wortman will look after the defense.

Moncton is out to beat the Halifax pros at any cost.

Nichols, a spare of the Montreal Wanderers, arrived in the city Friday, according to the Transcript, and turned out for practice in the evening. The Transcript then says: "Art Ross, undoubtedly one of the most brilliant, if not the most brilliant, defence man in the game today, has been wired and asked to name his price. Ross, in reply, stated that he feared it would be impossible for him to get away for any lengthy period, but wished to be given the dates of Moncton's games with the Crescents. He might be in a position to come for those. It is quite probable that when Ross names his figures, he will be given more or less of a surprise on having them accept it."

Walter Smail, also a regular member of the Montreal Wanderers, was wired last night and asked for his figures and for details in connection with the possibility of his figuring in the Moncton line-up.

EGGS COME DOWN FROM LOFTY PERCH

(Montreal Herald)

News about eggs at times has to be broken as carefully as the eggs themselves, but the latest,--that eggs have gone down in price, that they are even likely to keep on the downward path, is too good for the householder not to be heralded abroad.

Mr. Hislop, of the firm of Hislop & Hunter, said to The Herald that eggs had dropped on wholesale market value to thirty-two cents. That is, the strictly new laid eggs, of course, still lower, ranging from twenty-three to twenty-five cents per dozen. The fall in eggs, he explained, is due to the weakness of the American market, and to lightness of egg stocks everywhere. He did not think, however, that there would be any further decrease in price. Eggs may not go up again; but they are not likely to keep on going down.

WEATHER HAS DONE IT

Mr. Dionne told The Herald that eggs were selling retail for forty cents, which marks a drop in price of ten cents since last week. The forty cent eggs are, as might be supposed, the newly-laid. "Other" eggs are thirty-five cents. The mild weather, according to Mr. Dionne, is the cause of the decline of the egg's prestige as a costly article of table or culinary decoration.

Mr. Strong is of the opinion that eggs will continue to go down for the simple reason that they are daily growing more plentiful and that large supplies of them are constantly pouring in from all sides. "We have had more than we could handle," said Strong, "and have had to refuse several shipments." When asked where all the eggs so eagerly devoured by the city consumer (no matter what the price) come from, Mr. Strong mentioned the names of half a dozen places. Noyan, Hemmingford, Ormstown and many others. The price he quoted for new-laid eggs was forty-five cents per dozen.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


