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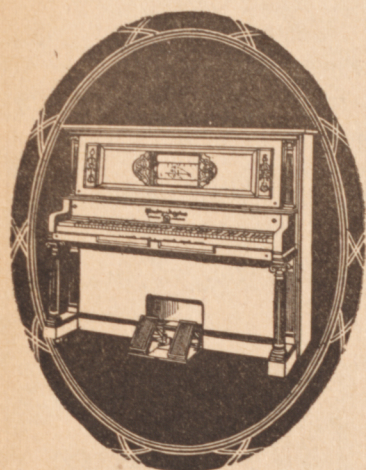

THE MISSES YOUNG**P. E. ISLANDS NEXT
RHODES SCHOLAR**

Hugh Warburton, the Successful Applicant is a Nephew of Sergt. Hobkirk of This City.

The first McGill student to be elected Rhodes Scholar from Prince Edward Island is Hugh C. Warburton of Charlottetown, P. E. I., news of whose appointment has just been received at the University in a cablegram from Dr. G. R. Parkin, secretary of the Rhodes Trust.

What lends additional interest to the appointment is the fact that Mr. Warburton, besides possessing very high qualifications for the scholarship is a particularly intimate friend of Walter J. Pearce, Arts '12, the recently elected Rhodes Scholar from McGill.

The Prince Edward Island appointee was born in Assam, India, in 1889, where his father, Dr. George Warburton, now a retired doctor of Charlottetown, was at that time a physician in the Indian army. Shortly after his birth his parents came to Prince Edward Island.

Entering the Prince of Wales College at an early age, he was soon marked for rapid advancement, and became very popular with his fellow students, among other positions assuming the editorship of the "Observer," the College paper, and figuring at intervals on the football, hockey and track teams.

Upon graduation from the Prince of Wales College, and obtaining a first-class teacher's license, Mr. Warburton came to McGill in the autumn of 1906, where, in the second year, he was successful in winning an exhibition of one hundred dollars.

Like success attended his efforts in the third year, when he won the Coster memorial prize, awarded for an English essay, open to competition to all students from the Maritime Provinces.

Nor has the newly elected scholar confined himself merely to his studies, but has played regularly on his class football and hockey teams. In addition he was last year the editor of the McGill Annual, the yearly publication of the undergraduate body, and president of the Prince Edward Island Club; and in this year a member of the house committee of the McGill Union.

He has taken an extremely active part in almost all the student activities. In his studies he has devoted himself largely to English literature, taking honors in that subject, and at Oxford he intends to specialize along that line and qualify himself for a professorship.

Mr. Warburton takes a keen interest in military matters, and for five years has been a member of No. 2 Company 4th Regiment, of the Canadian Artillery, which drills annually at Petawawa.

It is a somewhat peculiar coincidence that he is the sixth Rhodes scholar to be selected from that company which on three of those five occasions has been the company winning first place.

**STOLE A THOUSAND
FROM SIR WILLIAM**

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 28.—A story which was hushed up for several weeks came out here this morning concerning a daring robbery of the private car of Sir Wm. Mackenzie, while in Ottawa the day after he obtained his knighthood. The railway magnate had an appointment with Hon. Geo. P. Graham and, sleeping rather late, he rushed off to keep it, leaving a roll of \$6,000 in bills of large denominations lying exposed in the state room of his private car at the Central station.

It develops that a car porter found the money, but was evidently afraid to take all. Two bills of \$500 denomination on the outside were stripped off and the man disappeared, the rest of the money being afterwards found on the car floor.

The robbery was kept secret here, but two private detectives of Sir William caught the man at Windsor, Ont., where it is said he made a full confession and returned the \$1,000. Sir William dismissed him without instituting criminal proceedings.

HOW THEY LOOKED

History rarely gives us pictures of its heroes and heroines that make them visible to our eyes. Portraits of famous persons are not reliable. But one always wants to know what a historic personage looked like. Here are a few sketches taken at random from contemporary historians.

Mary, Queen of Scots, was red-headed and cross-eyed, and in spite of the encomiums of her contemporaries, was far from handsome.

Queen Elizabeth had a red nose and was much ashamed of it. She always took pains to have it powdered before making her appearance on a state occasion.

Madame Recamier was one of the most ethereal beauties ever seen in France. Even in old age, when she became totally blind, she was regarded as singularly beautiful.

Madame de Stael was ugly, with rough, irregular features, and a bad complexion. She was very sensitive in regard to her looks and disliked being complimented on her intellectual powers regarding the compliment as a slur on her lack of beauty.

Sir Walter Scott's eyes were a greyish blue and very keen. His hair was light, and he walked with a limp from an injury received in early life.

Gibbon's face was full and red. Late in life he became very stout and his features grew flabby. Only when interested in conversation did he show indications of the bright intellect that conceived and carried out what had been called the greatest historical work ever produced by the unaided labor of one man.

Addison had regular and pleasing features, unmarked by dissipation. Chaucer looked like a dandy, the impression being intensified by his dress.

Pope's features were small and delicate. All his life he was pale and looked sickly.

Bulwer Lytton was always considered an ugly man. He had a large, coarse nose, thick lips, and heavy, full features.

Hawthorne had the kindly face and manner of a village pastor, and more than once he was mistaken for a preacher.

Dickens' face was not disagreeable but his manner with strangers was not always pleasant and was sometimes even offensive.
