BOARD OF TRADE ENDORSES ACTION OF CITY COUNCIL

By Close Vote of 9 to 8 Members of Board
Condemn City Officials who Divert
Trade From Fredericton--Will Consider
Possibility of Holding Board Luncheon
--J. T. Jennings the New President.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held last night and was very lengthy, discussion on the increase done here by mail-order houses prolonging the meeting until eleven o'clock. The Board finally passed a resolution by a vote of 9 to 8, approving the action of the City Council in asking for an investigation of the charges preferred against Special Policeman Gunter and condemning any city official who endeavors to divert trade from the city.

Mr. John T. Jennings succeeded Mr. George W. Hodge as president, and Mr. H. S. Campbell succeeded Mr. J. J. F. Winslow as secretary.

In addition to electing officers and discussing the mail-order problem, the Board dealt also with the various reports presented. The proposal of President Hodge that a board luncheon be held was referred to the council of the board. There were also discussions on the threatened increase in fire-insurance rates, the St. John valley survey, commercial orcharding and civic-government by commission.

The resignation of Mr. J. J. F. Winslow of the office of secretary was received and accepted. On the motion of Mr. J. D. Phinney, a vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring secretary.

The following new members of the Board of Trade were elected: Messrs. Robert Scott, S. B. Hatheway, and W. S. Tompkins.

Mr. J. W. McCready presented the report of the Tourist Committee, which was adopted.

TOURIST COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Mr. McCready's report was as follows:—

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the FREDERICTON BOARD OF TRADE: YOUR TOURIST COMMITTEE beg to submit their fifteenth Annual Report.

During the year active advertising of our summer attractions was carried on through the medium of some

ten publications in the United States and Canada and something over two thousand inquiries asking for all kinds of information about the Province from people all over this Continent and to some extent in Great Britain, were answered. Upwards of four thousand Booklets were also distributed, a great many of those being sent in reply to individual requests, and in addition to these used at the Sportsmen's Shows, five hundred copies were sent to the New Brunswick Government Office in London, England, for distribution there by the officials of that Office. The following agencies were also kept supplied.—The International Railway Agency at Boston, Thomas Cook Tourist Company at Boston and New York, the Eastern S. S. Company, Beekman's and Masters Tourist Agencies, The Tourist Bureau of the Philadelphia Inquirer, Wampanoag's Sportsman's Bureau, the Busy Man's Tourist Bureau at Toronto as well as the leading hotels in the principal Maritime cities and summer resorts. Also the delegates to the Bi-Centenary of the Church of England at Halifax were each supplied with a copy. During the year the members of your Committee have made every possible effort to meet visitors to this city and explain to them the attractions of our Province.

A large number of prominent persons visited this city during the past summer, among whom may be mentioned His Lordship, the Bishop of London, so heartily welcomed by our citizens, Prof. Winch, of the Maine University and Dr. Whitney of Boston who spent some time in the Province taking photos of our natural scenery, and wild animals. Sir Robert Harvey, Bart. of England and the Earl of Kingston, Ireland, also spent several weeks here, the latter being so pleased with his visit that he has decided to return next summer with his wife and spend a couple of months in this country. Others were Col. Lampton and Editor Oliver of Yonkers, N. Y., Press Humorists, and Dr. W. T. Galpin, who is now publishing an illustrated story of his hunting trip to New Brunswick, in a New York Magazine. Dr. Walker of Glasgow, who was here during the autumn expects to come again next year and another welcome visitor was Mr. J. M. Gibbon, who secured a large amount of moving picture film in New Brunswick, taken by himself for exhibition in the British Isles. During the recent election campaign in Great Britain these pictures were shown at different points and received, according to the despatches, the applause of the public and the press of that country.

The demand for trout and salmon fishing has become very emphatic. During the year hundreds of inquiries have reached your Committee respecting such privileges in this Province, but as practically all our streams and lakes are under lease to private parties no satisfactory answers could be made to these questions. Judging however, from the growing popularity and attractiveness of this sport, it is safe to say that if the lakes and streams of our Province could be placed under one control and properly stocked and cared for the revenue derived in a very few years would not fall far

short of the amount now paid in for hunting licenses. It is very satisfactory to know that steps are now being taken to realize upon this natural asset of our country. This cannot be accomplished too soon.

Your committee are now making arrangements for the publication of a series of large pictures of an attractive style and permanent character, showing historic buildings, water powers and scenery. These it is intended to place upon steamships, in hotels at summer resorts and other public places. A complete set will also be sent to the Offices of the Commissioner for the Province at London. This with the continuation of careful advertising, part of which will include some English Journals, and getting ready a new booklet for 1912, is work that has so far been decided upon for the present year.

Your Committee desire to gratefully acknowledge the material assistance received from the Provincial Government and the many courtesies extended by the members of the Executive and the Officials of the Public Offices, without which the work accomplished would have been rendered impossible.

Mr. J. T. Jennings presented the report of the Transportation Committee.

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Mr. Jennings reported as follows:

To the President and Members of the Fredericton Board of Trade; Gentlemen:—

The Railway and Transportation Committee of your Board beg leave to submit to you their report of the year's work.

Early in the year meetings were held with the representatives of both the Canadian Pacific and Intercolonial Railways. As a result of the meetings with the C. P. R. representatives, an extra train was placed on the Gibbon branch, giving a tri-weekly service. This arrangement was continued during the time of the summer schedule, and when the fall time-table was brought into effect, this train was made a daily train. The inaugurating of this new service has been of great benefit to our merchants and we feel sure will be much appreciated by the people living in the district served by the Gibbon branch.

An effort was also made to secure an express service connecting with the Montreal and Boston trains east and west, but so far your committee has not been able to secure this much desired result.

Owing to the representations of your committee, the Canadian Pacific Railway has made an arrangement, whereby a certain number of Pullman berths are each morning allotted to the Fredericton for both the Montreal and Boston trains, which arrangement we feel will be very pleasing to the travelling public.

Our meeting with Intercolonial officials was of a very satisfactory character and several matters about which complaint was made were readjusted to the satisfaction of the committee.
