WANTED GRADUATES PREVENTED FROM PLAYING FOR COLLEGES

Mt. Allison and Acadia Behind Movement to Confine Inter-Collegiate Hockey to Under-Graduates.

Although the meeting of the Inter-collegiate Hockey League which was to have been held in St. John a few days ago did not materialize for some reason or other, it is probable that a schedule of games for the Summer trophy will be arranged shortly by Mount Allison, Acadia and the University of New Brunswick. This year Mount A. plays in Fredericton, Acadia plays here and the U. N. B. boys meet the Acadia team in Wolfville. Games with Kings College may also be on the schedule as the Windsor students are also desirous of entering the league.

UNDERGRADUATE RULE

Last year the silverware was won by Acadia and the Wolfville collegians are bent on retaining possession this winter. Nearly all the members of their 1910 septette will again be on hand this season and with them will be Gordon Richmond, who has a hockey reputation made down in Cape Breton. The U. N. B. boys, too, will have nearly all their 1910 players in line again since Archie Babbitt, Jack Feeney and Sterling have developed a desire for increased knowledge this winter. It is said that the Fredericton collegians expect also to have a couple of lively St. Stephen players on hand this winter. It is probable that this year will see the abolition of the rule allowing post-graduate students to play in the league games. Both Mount A. and Acadia are understood to favor the change. In the Intercollegiate Football League games post grads. are barred, the abolition of this rule in the hockey league would bar several men who otherwise might be seen in college uniforms this winter.

THE MOUNT A. TEAM

Of last year's Mount A. seven Stuart McKean, point, and Charlie McDougall, centre, are the only men who will be on hand this winter. McDougall, a Moncton boy, will captain the team. W. L. Murray, of Halifax, one of last year's substitutes, will also be available and may catch a place. Carl Milford, of Charlottetown, Charlie Thompson another Islander, Will Godfrey, of Chatham, Charlie McDonald of Truro, Harold Lewis of Sydney, Charlie Fowler, Wyllie Coates of Nappan, C. H. Cochran, the football captain, Charlie Mitton of Moncton, and one or two others are going to turn out. Whether or not any of them will prove 'finds' or even valuable players remains to be seen. Meanwhile, though The Tribune will probably be accused again of purposely belittling the Mount A. chances, the Garnet and Gold is not a good bet for honors in the Intercollegiate or any other hockey league.

It is understood that Mount A. has lines out for a good coach. The man in question is prepared to take the position.

AMHERST RAMBLERS DEFEATED CRESCENTS 3 TO 2

Amherst, Jan. 9.—The Ramblers defeated the Halifax Crescents in the third match of the Nova Scotia hockey league in a game tonight, the score standing 3 to 2.

The game was witnessed by 900 fans. Twaddle made his first appearance on the ice for this season. Chummy Murray was selected as referee. From the start the game was spectacular and marked by many brilliant plays. McGraw shone for the 'Crescents', proving himself a strong aggressive player. Early in the game Hunter received a severe blow in the face from the puck, and was obliged to retire, his place being taken by Monaghan, who played a steady game throughout.

The Crescents were the first to score, Condon landing the puck between the nets after fifteen minutes play. A moment later the Ramblers evened the score and during the next fifteen minutes added two more, the first half closing with the score 2 to 1 in favor of the Ramblers, and the puck in the Crescents territory.

In the second half the Crescents went in to win, but the Ramblers' defence proved too strong. Twaddle again and again retrieved the situation by his dash. For the greater part of the second half the puck was in the territory of the home team and near the close Monaghan scored another for the Halifax lads. But the bell rang down the curtain with the score 5-2 in the Amherst team's favor.

The game was free from rough play but was delayed by several accidents.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
