BRITISH STRIKE SITUATION

London, Aug. 18.—One of the gravest features of the situation in London is a threatened strike by the employees of the Underground Railway. Hundreds of thousands of persons use the tubes to get to and from their business and their stoppage would greatly increase the suffering and demoralization which is being caused by the strike on the railways.

Thus far, according to the officials of the underground companies, only 500 of their employees have struck. This is but a small percentage of the men employed in the tubes but their defection already has curtailed the service and only a few trains are running tonight. The underground strikers held a mass meeting tonight and passed a resolution not to return to work until satisfactory terms have been arranged through their executive or until all the other railway men who have struck are restored to their positions under government guarantees.

MORE COMPLAINTS.

The strike is throwing a large amount of extra work on London's tramway service, and the tramway men are reported to be complaining. There have been serious fears of a strike of the employees of this branch of railway men and if it should come about, it would deprive Londoners of almost their last available means of cheap transportation. Last night the railway companies announced that all their excursion trains had been withdrawn from service. This will make the usual week end trips to the country by the populace impossible.

"TAY PAY" CALLED IN CONFERENCE.

Mr. Churchill, the home secretary, tonight asked T. P. O'Connor and Colonel Gerald Kyffin-Taylor, members of parliament for Liverpool, to recommend the measures the government should take to settle the strike troubles there and restore good relations between the different classes. Mr. Churchill also requested that they consult with the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, and report to him concerning the food supply and the general conditions of his city. Mr. O'Connor and Colonel Kyffin-Taylor started immediately for Liverpool.

THE CAMPAIGN IN CANADA

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 19.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, heading the fight of the Liberals, and Robert L. Borden, the Conservative leader, today ended the first week of their platform campaigns, the Premier closing in the city of Quebec and Mr. Borden at Palmerston, Ont. Sir Wilfrid plans to devote the coming week to the Montreal district, while Mr. Borden will be heard in Toronto, Berlin, Peterboro and several other cities of Ontario.

CATHOLIC LAYMEN TO MEET

Columbus, O., Aug. 19.—During the four days beginning tomorrow Ohio's capital city is to have the honor of entertaining what is expected to be the greatest gathering of Catholic laymen ever assembled in this country. The occasion will be the tenth annual convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies, which embraces the Ancient Order of Hibernians, the Knights of St. John, the Holy Name Societies, the Catholic Order of Foresters and other organizations having an aggregate membership exceeding one million.

A special pontifical mass at the Cathedral will usher in the convention tomorrow morning and in the afternoon there will be a big parade in which 12,000 marchers, about one fourth of them in uniform, will take part. The business sessions will begin Monday morning and the convention will be brought to a close with a banquet Wednesday night. Social reform and the participation of Catholic laymen in such movements will form the main subject of discussion. The Most Rev. Diomedes Falconio, the apostolic delegate at Washington, will attend the convention and Archbishop Moeller of Cincinnati, Bishop Canevin of Pittsburgh, Bishop McFaul of Trenton and numerous other prelates of note will take part.

The American fishing vessels are now manned by Canadians and have a great advantage over Canadian vessels because of the duty. The Canadian gets \$3.62 per hundred weight from the Halifax combine whereas the American gets \$7 in Boston. In Halifax mackerel is fifteen cents per pound but in Boston it is thirty-three.
