

FREDERICTON N. B.INTELLIGENT FARMER  
ENDORSES RECIPROCITY

To the Editor of The Daily Mail:

Dear Sir—This great question of reciprocity before the electors of Canada is one that all farmers especially feel interested in. For more than half a century we have been engaged in the business of farming and have had quite an experience in shipping business and I have found that the high tariff has been a great barrier in the way of raising potatoes especially, and it is from this standpoint that I would give a little of what I have learned. A good many years ago we were not troubled as we are now with rust and potato bugs and potatoes put in on almost any kind of ground would thrive and do well. And as a general thing farmers would find a fair local market. Later on, the American market opened up so that any surplus we might have on hand could be shipped across there, to Boston or New York. The duty was high, which, of course, kept the price sometimes down to a pretty low figure; still, it was the best we could do. I remember one year hauling them down to St. Mary's and selling for forty-five cents a barrel. The shipper had to pay twenty-five cents a bushel duty. Had that been off I would have realized a dollar or more a barrel for my potatoes. Now, we farmers think that potatoes can be raised for a dollar a barrel. It has sometimes been the case that duty and all we have sold for shipping for two dollars a barrel. Some twenty-five years ago a potato dealer in New York to whom I had shipped came on to see me. I had on hand two car loads of first-class potatoes.

He asked me what I wanted for them. I told him two dollars and twelve cents. He offered two dollars and eight, loaded on the cars here and so he took them. That was an exceptional year. Now the great trouble here on this side of the tariff wall is that we do not dare go into potato raising to any extent we have to confine ourselves to raising a few instead of going into it as a business and there can be no better potatoes raised in the world, I think I can safely say than in New Brunswick and especially in York county. If we had the duty removed we could count on at least one dollar per barrel safely and so go into the business on a large scale and whereas now the business with farmers is so small that it won't afford to buy the improved facilities for cultivating them. If we had free access to the American markets farmers could afford to purchase the necessary machinery in order to raise them cheaply (which would add to the profits) and so instead of only planting an acre or so, we could safely go into potato raising so as to make it a profitable business on a large scale. We have the land and all we want is the sure market and then an enterprising spirit will soon be stirred among farmers when we know the market is sure.

P. S.—We say we have the land, yes, take for instance the little valley of the Penniac, there is much of the land of that settlement that is now growing up with bushes that might be cleared up and used for growing potatoes, the high tariff has sent the young men of that place to seek homes elsewhere. The potato crop is the one crop that farmers can raise for export, and in that little settlement as in hundreds of others in this province, take away the high tariff, open up the American market and that together with the Cuban


trade and our own local market will give us immense advantages in the farming business and instead of our young men leaving for homes in other places they will find profitable employment at home. Our lands in New Brunswick are not adapted to raising drops for export on a large scale except potatoes and hay, on potatoes the duty being 25 cents per bushel and on hay four dollars a ton, take that duty off and it seems but reasonable to conclude that a great interest will be aroused among the farmers of this province.


