OLD "CY" YOUNG
SNAPPED UP BY
BOSTON NATIONALS

Will Wear Rustler Uniform for Bal-
ance of Season--Good Drawing
Card with Boston Fans.

Boston, Aug. 14--"Cy" Young the
veteran pitcher, turned loose by
Cleveland on Tuesday has been grab-
bed up by the Boston Nationals and
will join the team on Monday.

On Wednesday Aug. 9, the last day
that the Cleveland team was at the
Huntingdon Av grounds playing the
Red Sox, Young once the idol of the
Boston fans was on the coaching
lines and he got a splendid sendoff.

When it was announced from Cleve-
land that Pres. Somers had given the
pitcher his unconditional release af-
ter his 22 years of major league ser-
vice, the fans who saw the Aug. 9,
game here were glad that they had
seen the old timer just on the eve of
his retirement from the big league
circuit.

NOT THROUGH YET

But "Cy" isn't through with major
league baseball yet and he's going to
have another chance to show that he
isn't, right here in Boston. Yester-
day the owners of the Boston Na-
tional league team completed a deal
with the old fellow to come to Bos-
ton to wear a Rustler uniform for at
least the remainder of the season.

Young has been playing major league
ball since 1890, and so this is his
22nd year. He is credited with win-
ning 507 games of big league baseball.
When Pres. Russell heard "Cy" was
loose he at once started negotiations
that will bring him back to Boston
--and he'll get a good reception for
he has a lot of friends in both lea-
gues.

TAYLOR GLAD

Pres. Taylor of the Red Sox when
told that his old pitcher was com-
ing back to Boston said: "Well I
wish him luck and hope that he will
remain in major league baseball
many seasons longer."

"Cy" Young who was born in 1867
first pitched professionally in 1890
for the Canton, O., club and won 30
of the 37 games in which he worked.
He was bought by Cleveland before
the end of the year greatly strength-
ening that team and proving a great
help toward winning the National
league pennant of 1892.

He played with Cleveland until
1898 when the team was merged with
St. Louis and he was in the latter
city through 1900.

In 1901 he came to Boston to play
with the Red Sox, remaining here un-
til two years ago, when he went
back to Cleveland. Thus in 22 years
of major league baseball he has played
as a representative of only three
cities.

DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be
held in November next at the exami-
nation centres of the Civil Service
Commission for the entry of Naval
Cadets for the Naval Service of Can-
ada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the
ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of
January next; must be British sub-
jects and must have resided in Cana-
da for two years immediately preced-
ing the examination; short periods
of absence abroad for purpose of edu-
cation to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the
Royal Naval College at Halifax, in
January next; the course at the Col-
lege is two years and the cost to
parents, including board, lodging, uni-
form and all expenses is approxi-
mately \$400 for the first year and
\$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets
will be rated midshipmen, and will re-
ceive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.
Parents of intending candidates
should make application to the Sec-
retary Civil Service Commission, Ot-
tawa, before the 15th October next.

TOMMY MURPHY
WON THREE RACES
AT COLUMBUS

Matched Race Between Earl, Jr., and
Independence Boy Likely Next
Week--Valentine Reinstated.

Columbus, O., Aug. 18.--Tommy
Murphy had three fields of trotters
and pacers at his mercy today, win-
ning every race on the card. He put
Twinkling Dan across in the 2:06 pace
because Zulu Hal, the favorite, was
off form and finally distanced. In
the 2:18 pace and the 2:09 trot his
horses had the speed of the party.

Charley Mitchell got a bad start
in the 2:09 trot, losing the first heat
to Bivolo after almost closing a big
gap, but the next three miles found
Murphy's trotter going nicely. Long-
worth B won the 2:18 pace in
straight heats.

"Not up to the high standard of
the other two days," was the ver-
dict on the program. There was good
cause, however, for the three-year-
old trotters who were ready to score
for the first heat of the Kentucky
Stockfarm futurity, worth \$4,500, re-
fused to begin the race because no
representative of that paper was pre-
sent with the money.

This event was raced over the
track last year under protest of the
owners, who did not get their pay
until Lexington was reached, and no
one cared to take a similar chance
today.

Charles Valentine, the trainer, sus-
pended for ninety days at Kalama-
zoo, was today temporarily reinstat-
ed by the American trotting board.
He drove Mazine Audubon in the last
heat of the 2:18 pace, but the mare
was drawn after the second heat on
account of lameness.

Since the pacing duel between Earl
Jr and Independence Boy yesterday,
negotiations have been started for a
match race between them next week
for \$5000 a side. The owners of both
horses are agreed on the proposition.
In fact, the challenge came from the
owner of the Cox pacer. Walter Cox
has been wired to at Buffalo. If he
returns a favorable answer this race
will become a reality.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head
of a family, or any male over eigh-
teen years old, may homestead a
quarter section of available Domin-
ion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan
or Alberta. The applicant must ap-
pear in person at the Dominion Lands
Agency for the district. Entry by
proxy may be made at any agency,
on certain conditions, by father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or
sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each
of three years. A homesteader may
live within nine miles of his home-
stead on a farm of at least eighty
acres, solely owned and occupied by
him or by his father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader
in good standing may pre-empt a
quarter section alongside his home-
stead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties
--Must reside upon the homestead or
(including the time required to earn
homestead patent) and cultivate fifty
acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted
his homestead right and cannot ob-
tain a pre-emption, may enter for a
purchased homestead in certain dis-
tricts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties
--Must reside six months in each of
three years, cultivate fifty acres and
erect a house worth \$300.00.
