## AMHERST FINDS ERROR IN CENSUS RETURNS

Amherst, Nov. 29.—The citizens of Amherst not being satisfied with the census returns of the commission, the School Board arranged to have a second census taken. E. F. Lay, supervisor of the schools; John Bradley, secretary of the boys work of the town; C. A. Pugsley and B. Nicol have just completed a very careful enumeration which shows the actual population to be 333 more than the official returns. The commissioner reported 9,973, while Mr. Lay's report shows 9,310. This is an increase of 4134 over 1910. Mr. Lay reports that there were only about a dozen houses vacant in the whole town and that there were none who could not obtain work. They also report the town to be in more than the normal condition of health.

## AMERICAN JURY TO DECIDE PROPRIETY OF EUTHANASIA

Kissimmee, Fla., Nov. 28.—Rarely has a grand jury in this State or elsewhere been confronted with a more delicate or difficult task than is the grand jury which met here today to take up the case of the two Shakers, Brother Egbert B. Gillette and Sister Elizabeth Sears, charged with willful murder for having caused the death of another member of the Shaker Colony near Ashton, Sister Sadie L. Marchant, on August 22, last by having administered chloroform to her.

More than ordinary interest is attached to this case and the action of the grand jury will be awaited with sympathetic attention throughout the country for the case in question involves a striking example of a conflict between humane sympathy and the law and places upon the grand jury the burden of deciding whether euthanasia is justifiable under certain conditions or must rigidly be adjudged a crime no matter what may be the surrounding conditions.

Sister Sadie L. Marchant one of the members of the small Shaker colony which owns a farm of about 7000 acres around Lake Alligator near Ashton, died on August 22 last after having suffered for some time from consumption. After her death it was rumored that her Shaker friends had relieved her sufferings and, at her own request, had "assisted her out of her tortuous life" by administering chloroform to her. The matter was brought to the attention of the authorities and an investigation was made. Brother Gillette and Sister Sears who had been with Sister Marchant at the time of her death, admitted without hesitation that they had helped Sister Marchant to a painless and peaceful death by giving her chloroform.

At the same time the coroner began an investigation of the case and on September 6, the body of Sister Sadie was exhumed. The medical examination of the body is said to have shown that the disease of Sister Sadie had not been so far advanced as was stated by Brother Gillette and that judging from the condition of her lungs, she might have lived for some time. The coroners jury thereupon gave a verdict finding Brother Gillette guilty of willful murder.

Brother Gillette was rearrested and held to await the action of the grand jury without being admitted to bail. Sister Elizabeth not having been indicted by the coroners jury was permitted to remain under bail.

It is understood that no attempt will be made on the part of Brother Gillette to deny the simple facts of the case. As there is nothing in the laws of the State of Florida that could be construed into sanctioning the practice of euthanasia under any condition it is feared the grand jury will have no alternative in the case but will be obliged to indict.
