FATAL SHOOTING ENDED

Before anyone interfered with him,
he walked out of the place, leaving his
victim on a chair. Fitzsimmons was
then taken to the hospital and died
an hour later. After the shooting,
Ross left the theatre and walked
around a few hours. He was just
leaving his hotel quarters, evidently
with the idea of escaping, when the
constable arrived. At the police sta-
tion a revolver with two bullets and
an empty cartridge, was found in his
hip pocket. He was anxious to know
about Fitzsimmons' condition and
asked Sergeant Fisher to telephone
to the Royal Victoria Hospital. When
asked what started the fight that led
up to the shooting, Ross said that
they were playing a game of "Black
Jack" after the show, and that Fitz-
simmons tried to cheat him out of
\$14 on an ace that he had picked up
of the table. He refused to pay the
amount as the limit was only two
dollars. "I am Fitzsimmons,"
struck him, smashed his glasses and
tried to break his back across a
bench.

"I lost my head and in the excite-
ment pulled the revolver from my
pocket and fired," said Ross as his
head fell forward in his hands.

Ross has a wife and child in Ottawa
and is forty-six years old. Fitzsim-
mons is single.

COCAINE RESPONSIBLE

That the cocaine habit in conjunc-
tion with a quick and violent tem-
per and the ever ready revolver are
responsible for the tragedy, is stated
today. Others who participated in
the "Black Jack" game, which had
such a tragic conclusion, declare
that Ross was a man of very uncer-
tain temper, an inveterate gambler,
and a bad loser. He also bears the
reputation of using cocaine.

The last rites of the church were
administered to Fitzsimmons, just
before his death, and he died with a
smile saying, "May God have mercy
on me and him too." The inquest
will be held tomorrow.

A BIG FRESHET

The heavy rainstorm of Tuesday
night caused a big freshet along the

ice jammed and piled up to a depth
of six feet at Douglass' mill dam.
The jam finally broke and went out
with a rush, but fortunately did no
damage.

it, Tom, but none of that sleeping
stuff for me. Just tell them to strap
me down tight and then go to it. I
can stand it."

eager to learn if a program had been
arranged to take the place of the one
in which he had been scheduled to
defend his title against Freddie Welsh
at Vernon. The removal of his ap-
pendix apparently has not lessened
the champion's interest in the game.

ST. JOHN DEVELOPMENT

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—The Borden gov-
ernment has not decided to carry
out Hon. Pugsley's plan for the de-
velopment of St. John as a national
al port, by the developm at o.
Courtenay Bay.

Dr. Pugsley called attention to R.
L. Borden's election telegram which
stated that "the thorough and effi-
cient equipment of St. John is a
part of our policy."

Today Mr. Borden admitted that
he had sent such a telegram and ad-
mitted that he was at the time
aware of Dr. Pugsley's extensive pro-
gramme for the equipment of the
port.

When asked if it was the inten-
tion of the government to carry out
the work, Mr. Monk could only tell
parliament that the government had
not yet decided to do so.

The government today failed to tell

respecting the Intercolonial board of
management.

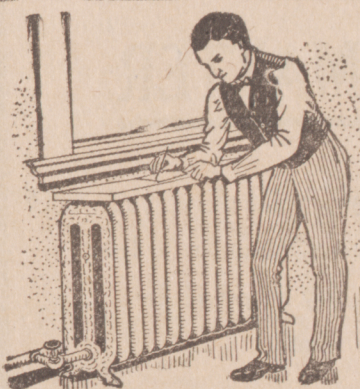
