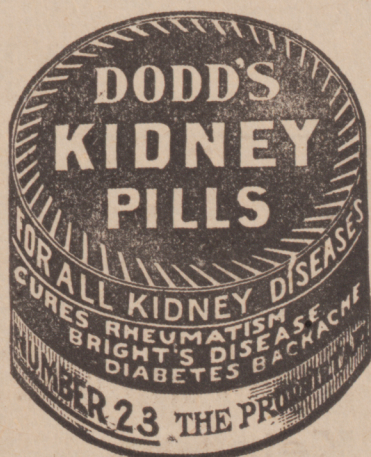
TO DEBATE THE NECESSITY OF WAR

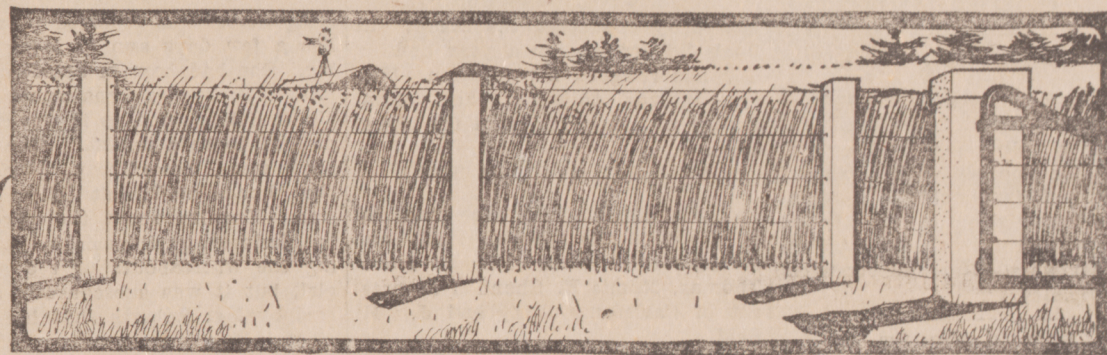
