## PROF. LEACOCK

## AND RECIPROCITY

(Montreal Witness)

Professor Leacock of McGill University, puts his weight in the opposite scale to that of Dr. Andrew Macphail in the reciprocity controversy, with a sort of intention perhaps to make a balance, so far as the articulated opinion of college professors is concerned. How fair Professor Leacock is may be seen from his statement that it is the attempt of a few men to force a fiscal policy on the Canadian people; and that it is the worst possible distortion of democratic government. Professor Leacock of course knows very well that it is nothing of the sort. Nothing could be more constitutional all through.

The ministers in both countries came to a common agreement by means of the only machinery that could be used in such cases; and the agreement thus arranged was submitted to the inevitable tribunal—the representatives of the people in Parliament. Professor Leacock makes much of the fact that the 'demand' for reciprocity came from the United States. He knows that it could have come from no other place, the conditions being such that Canada could not make overtures or discuss the matter at all. That demand was in reality what in the venacular is called a 'climb down.' It was a reversal of the state of things under Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper, when they used to go Washington and ask for reciprocity, and were refused. After Washington had treated Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the same way, he declared that Washington would have to do the begging in the future, and that is just what has happened. Professor Leacock is unfortunate, so far as the side he takes is concerned, in alleging declarations on the part of those who approve reciprocity, that the agreement will mean higher prices for the farmer's wheat, while it will make all food cheaper. It is the protectionists who, on the other hand, have been telling the farmers that the reciprocity treaty will not benefit them—indeed that they will probably find themselves worse off—and on the other hand that the general consumer may find that the cost of living may be higher than it is now. In the same illogical way the preferential tariff people tell us that that policy would greatly benefit the Canadian farmer, but, that, nevertheless, the British poor man would not have to pay more for his bread. Could illogicality go further! In the United States it is seen that there are many who like reciprocity as little as Professor Leacock and those for whom he speaks. This is not so much because of the present reciprocity agreement as because they are sure that if it comes into force it will mean the beginning of the knocking out of the underpinning of the protection fortress. There will be lively times for protection when Congress meets in special session in April. No one can complain any longer as Dr. Macphail says that our politics lack interest.

West Palm Beach, Fla., March 7.—Aviation and wireless telegraphy were combined yesterday when Percy Norris an operator ascended with J. A. D. McCurdy, the Canadian aviator, and received signals exchanged between Key West and Havana. He also picked up a message sent by a fruit steamer to the Key West wireless station.

Norris carried a wireless apparatus in his lap. He was unable to hear anything from the Palm Beach station which sent him signals.

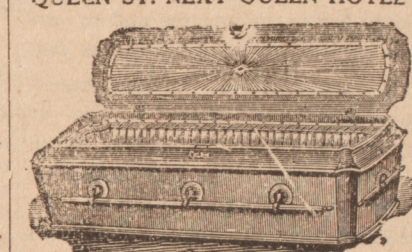
