If he could not find men in that country to properly look after the administration of justice there, he should send in men from other parts of the province. Mr. Copp went on to say that he based these statements on his own personal knowledge and the hon. Attorney General could very quickly learn the facts if he would take the trouble to make enquiries.

He and his colleagues had been very severely criticised, Mr. Copp went on, because of some remarks they made in meetings recently held in Westmorland. He admitted having made the observations in regard to bridge outlays as reported and he proposed to repeat them. If he was not correct the Auditor General's report was to blame and not he, because he had quoted only from that report. His friend and colleague, (Mr. Sweeney), did refer to monopolies and particularly to the New Brunswick Telephone Company. He believed the New Brunswick Telephone Company to be a monopoly that is bleeding the people of this province.

Hon. Mr. Hazen—How about your friend, Frank Carvell?

Mr. Copp said that he was not here to defend Mr. Carvell and he did not care anything about his connection with the Telephone Company. When the leader of the government admits, as he did, that he himself is a stockholder in the Telephone Company, he pleads guilty to being one of those who are bleeding the users of telephones in this country. He had said at a meeting in St. John, and he would repeat, that he did not care who had the aristocrats and the autocrats but give him the common people. The Liberal party had always been the friends of the common people and they are the friends of the common people today. He believed it is the proper thing to discuss these things because the closer we get to the common people the better we will be.
