CHATHAM PEOPLE
WANT ADDITIONAL
SUBSIDY FOR FERRY

Delegation Here to Press Claims on Provincial Government --- Service Maintained At Loss.

A delegation from Chatham composed of Mayor R. A. Snowball, Ald. M. F. Haley and John McDonald, arrived in the city at 1.30 this afternoon and waited upon the provincial government at 2.30 for the purpose of securing an increased subsidy for the steam-ferry which plies between Chatham and the north bank of the Miramichi River. The application for the increased grant is being made on the ground that the ferry at present is not self-supporting.

Mr. Snowball, speaking to a representative of The Mail, said that for the past six years, or since the time when its present owners took over the ferry-service mentioned, the ferry had been run at an annual loss. Those persons interested in it have reached a point at which they want additional assistance from the government, and not getting that, will discontinue the service. At the present time a subsidy is paid for the service, but is not adequate.

The members of the delegation hope to conclude their business here this afternoon and intend to return to Chatham tonight.

MURRAY, YOUNG SON OF
JOHN A. YOUNG, M. P. P.,
DIED THIS MORNING

Murray Young, son of Mr. John A. Young, M.P.P., of Taymouth, died suddenly at seven o'clock this morning. News of the death was received in this city with sincere regret, as Mr. Young's own serious illness has prevented him from attending to his legislative duties and has been the cause of much anxiety to his family and his friends.

The deceased was born February 3rd, 1903, and was in his ninth year at the time of his death. He is survived by six brothers and two sisters. The funeral will take place at two o'clock Friday morning.

Appendicitis was the cause of death. The boy was taken ill with this disease a few days ago. He was operated on at midnight Monday and rallied after the operation to such an extent that his recovery was expected. He suffered a relapse last night, however, and death occurred this morning. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.

IN MONTHLY SESSION

McPherson, Magistrate Clayton took his place and Mayor Hatt presided. The minutes of the last meeting were read and the affairs were found to be in a satisfactory condition. The usual bills were ordered paid. A communication came from Toronto asking for aid for the Rescue Home in St. John. On consideration it was put on file.

J. B. McNAIR LEADER

A trial debate between the first and second teams was held in the U. N. B. library last night to pick a leader for the first team. J. B. McNair '11 was chosen by the judges Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Dr. O. C. Jones and Dr. Kierstead, to lead the first team. The other members of the team are Ralph B. Clark '11 and J. T. Hebert '12.

MAYOR THOMAS ENTERTAINED
ALDERMEN AND CITY OFFICIALS

Council Closed Its Year's Labors in Pleasant Manner---His Worship and Aldermen Take Optimistic View of City's Future.

There was a very pleasant gathering at Washington's Restaurant last night, when the aldermen, a number of the city officials and other guests were entertained by His Worship Mayor Thomas. In addition to the members of the City Council, there were present Police Magistrate Marsh City Clerk McCready, City Auditor McKay, Commissioner R. H. Boone, City Marshal Roberts, Mr. James Biggs, City Engineer Feeney and representatives of the press.

It has been some time since the Chief Magistrate of the city has entertained the members of the Council in this manner and the courtesy of Mayor Thomas was much appreciated.

At the end of the supper there was a short toast list, which included "The King," "His Worship the Mayor," "The Aldermen," "The City Officials," and "The Press." The gathering was also favored with several solos by Mr. Biggs.

MAYOR THOMAS.

In a short address, the Mayor referred to the pleasant year which had passed since the present council had assumed control of civic affairs. His Worship mentioned several improvements made during the year, including the laying of Tarvia on Queen street, the enlargement of the back drain, the repairing of the City Hall, and the improvement of the wharves. On the whole, the council had done the city's business well. However, he would like to see the streets better kept in summer, with fewer burdocks. He also felt the time had come when Fredericton should have new railway stations. (Hear! Hear!)

THE ALDERMEN.

Ald. Hooper said that the year had passed pleasantly, and with some exceptions, the aldermen had worked together in harmony.

Ald. Mitchell made reference to the work that had been done in the street department, and spoke highly of the City Engineer's work. He also advocated the further enlargement of the back drain.

Ald. Walker made a plea for the new central fire station and prophesied that it would be built at an early date. As far as elections were concerned the electors could do no better than return the old council. (Laughter.)

Ald. Clark said that he was about to complete his seventh year as an alderman. He was of the opinion that the council of 1910 had given its best attention to the city's business. It compared favorably with any of similar size. What was needed was a spirit of optimism. There was no reason why Fredericton should not double its population within the next ten years. (Applause.) The civic year had passed very pleasantly.

CITY OFFICIALS.

Among the City Officials who spoke was Police Magistrate Marsh, who stated that the city was advancing and gave some interesting reminiscences of old times. Others who spoke were the City Engineer, the City Clerk, the City Auditor and Commissioner Boone. The City Engineer spoke of the success that had attended the introducing of Tarvia pavement and suggested that the \$4,000 surplus in the water department be devoted to the creation of a sinking fund.
