Robert E. Graham will sing the role of Sir Joseph Porter in "Pinafore" in place of Henry E. Dixey. Mr. Graham sang the role years ago.

"What the Doctor Ordered," the comedy by A. E. Thomas which is to follow "Seven Days" at the Astor Theatre, in New York, will then go to Boston.

Kitty Gordon is to go starring next season in "The Enchantress," a new musical piece by Victor Herbert, Harry B. Smith and Mme. Fred de Gresac.

Lucy Weston is booked to play the title role of "The Quaker Girl" when Henry B. Harris makes the American production of the musical play in October.

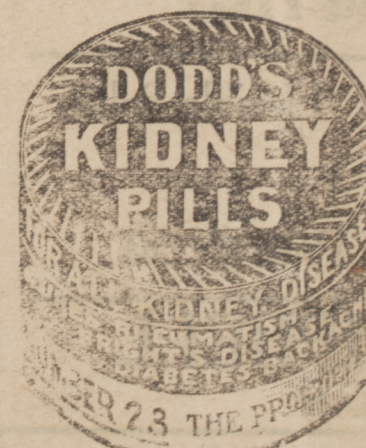
The composer of "The Girl of the Golden West" dedicated his work to Queen-Mother Alexandra, who sent a letter of thanks and a jeweled present to Puccini.

## CANADIAN PARLIAMENT RESUMES BUSINESS

Ottawa, July 19.—The Commons re-assembled yesterday afternoon with only about one-half of the members present and these grumbling at the prospect of two more months in Ottawa before the business of the session is concluded and the way cleared for prorogation with an election immediately afterwards.

The House resumed without any political fireworks. Before the orders of the day were called the opposition fired several questions at the government. Hon. Mr. Fisher promised to tell Mr. Borden tomorrow what were the prospects for early census returns.

Ten minutes after the opening Hon. Mr. Pickfield moved the House into committee on the reciprocity resolutions. The opposition obstruction began at once. Mr. Middleboro moved a time killing amendment urging some federal reward for the Fenian raid veterans. He spoke at length to this first example of what is to come for the next fortnight or so at best.

SIR WILFRID WARMLY GREETED.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who on rising was greeted enthusiastically by his followers, replied very briefly. He pointed out that the question was some forty odd years old, that it had been first dealt with by Sir John A. Macdonald and his government and that no reason had been advanced by the opposition why the judgment passed on the matter by Sir John at that time should be now revised. For himself, the premier said, he would not be disposed to treat all the veterans of these raids on the same basis. Some there were—and he himself was one—who had not arrived on the scene until all the fighting was over.

"I got a medal for my services on that occasion," observed Sir Wilfrid "but I did not deserve it. I had no claim."

His regiment had arrived too late to take part in the engagement and all he had done was picket and garrison duty. For his part he thought that any consideration shown should go to those who had fought for their country and borne the heat and burden of the day.

The division bells rang at six o'clock and the Middleboro amendment was rejected by a vote of 61 to 45. But an afternoon had been wasted.

At the opening of the evening session Mr. Smith of Algoma, directed the attention to the catastrophe by fire in the Porcupine district and asked if it was the intention of the government to extend substantial aid to the stricken country and the sufferers.

The third attempt of the minister of finance to get on with reciprocity was successful, and at nine o'clock last night the resolution moved by Mr. Fellows at 3.10 yesterday afternoon was carried. Mr. Arthur, Parry Sound, resumed the reciprocity debate, from the opposition benches, along the lines already repeatedly thrashed out. He was followed at 10.40 by J. D. Taylor of New Westminster, who made an ineffectual effort to secure an adjournment.
