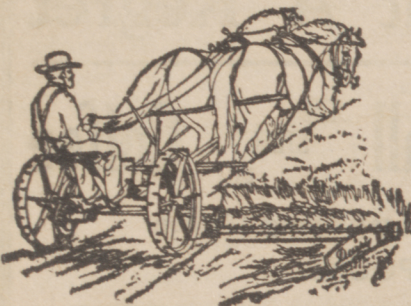

Woodstock, July 19—The circuit races postponed from yesterday were held this afternoon with a fair sized attendance. The 2.20 class was first called. This race was hotly contested, but finally Frank Power won the heat and race, although he was closely pressed by Pauline, with Idle Moments and Prince Wilkie close contenders. Pauline got second money, and Idle Moments fourth money.

The 2.17 class was a fight from the first between H. A. D. and Prince Louie. The latter won the first heat and H. A. D. the second. Dimple K. came strong on the third heat and nosed out H. A. D.

The fourth heat went to Dimple K. Mary Cromwell and Allie W., not starting according to the rules.

The final heat was won by Dimple K., who was coming strong all the time. Frank Power, is a Halifax horse. Prince Louie comes from St. Stephen, while H. A. D. and Dimple K., are owned in Presque Isle, Me. Andy Williams of Woodstock, proved a capable starter.

The judges were W. H. Keyes, of St. Stephen; J. T. G. Hatt, of Marysville and F. L. Thompson, of Woodstock. W. P. Lindow, clerk. Ex-Ald. Coles W. Dugan is conducting the races.

The 2.25 class and free-for-all will be trotted tomorrow. In the former class, Baring, a Halifax horse, is the favorite. Oswego Boy, of Attleboro, Mass., second choice.

In the free-for-all, Gallagher, 2.03 1/2, of Halifax, a grand circuit horse, is the favorite, with Roy Del Diabolo Presque Isle, second choice.

New Pitcher to Join Team at Woodstock Today--Team May be Further Strengthened

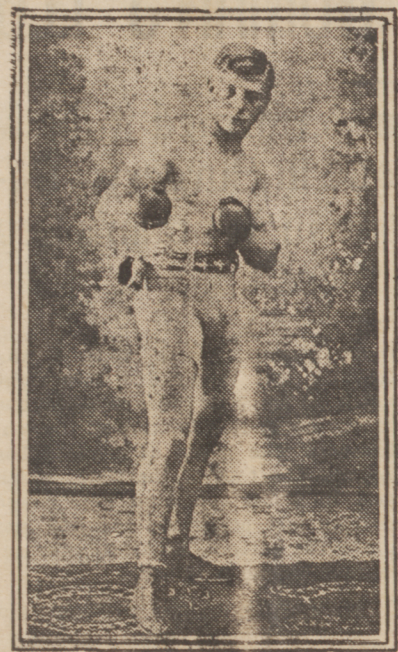
