LAURIER'S VINDICATION

Earl Grey who recently retired from the office of Governor General of Canada, was banqueted by the Royal Colonial Institute in London, on Tuesday night and made a notable speech. He dealt with Canada and Canadian affairs and some observations which he made are not likely to bring much joy to the flag flapping politicians in Canada who were so much in evidence during the recent election campaign. It will be generally admitted that Earl Grey as Governor General discharged the duties of his high office in a manner most acceptable to all classes of the Canadian people. He made a close study of conditions and did all in his power to advance the interests of the country and strengthen the tie which binds us to the motherland. Now that he has returned to England, he has given evidence of continued interest in Canada where he spent several happy years, and it is safe to say that he will sing the praise of this country and its people at every opportunity.

In the speech which he delivered at the banquet of the Royal Colonial Institute it was only natural that he should have made reference to the recent Canadian elections. He struck the nail squarely on the head when he said:

"In justice to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, MY AFFECTION AND ADMIRATION FOR THAT DISTINGUISHED STATESMAN REQUIRES ME TO SAY THAT HE AND HIS GOVERNMENT WERE ACTUATED BY NO ANNEXATION SENTIMENT IN THE POLICY THEY ADOPTED. IT WAS CERTAINLY IN NO SENSE A POLICY OF DISLIKE TO CLOSER CONNECTION WITH THE MOTHER COUNTRY."

A statement of this kind emanating from such a high source ought to make those who went around the country during the recent campaign shouting about annexation and disloyalty feel like thirty cents Earl Grey not only paid a well deserved tribute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier but he practically told his hearers that the defeat of the Liberal party was largely brought about by misrepresentation and slander. Nobody can compare Earl Grey's calm summing up of the situation with the frantic screams of unscrupulous Tory politicians and newspapers during the recent campaign without arriving at the conclusion that it is still possible to fool some of the people some of the time. A large number of the electors of Canada were certainly stampeded by the flag flappers of Canada during the recent elections, into voting against a business proposition that would have been of great benefit to the country.

FLAG-FLAPPING WAYS

A correspondent addresses the following interesting communication to The Toronto Star:

"Kindly inform your readers if Mr. W. H. Rowley, retiring president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, who, at the annual meeting this week, emphasized 'the pressing need of educating our people to buy Canadian-made goods wherever possible,' is the identically same Mr. W. H. Rowley, manager of the Eddy Works at Hull, Que., who was reported by The Ottawa Free Press, several weeks ago, as having placed insurance on his life, amounting to \$100,000 all in United States companies in preference to equally sound British and Canadian companies?

If true, is it not passing strange that these leading manufacturers should seriously ask other people on patriotic grounds to do what they don't practise themselves? These men

have the cheek to tell us that 'the present rates of tariff protection,' under which Canadian manufacturers have enjoyed unprecedented prosperity during the Laurier regime, 'will never be adequate unless Canadian buyers will give preference at all times to home-manufactured goods'; and yet they themselves never hesitate to use American materials and machinery, and to employ American architects, contractors and skilled workmen in their own private or corporate enterprises.

When the fierce Imperialist Premier Whitney wants to cross the Atlantic, he invariably travels via the New York Star steamship route, instead of by the British-Canadian all-red route. When the Whitney government requires the services of a first-class architect to superintend the erection of a new Government House, no Canadian architect is good enough for the job. An alien must forsooth be imported from New York or Chicago.

The two hundred rich manufacturers representing a capital of \$500,000,000, who have been holding a joy-feast over 'the obsequies of reciprocity,' in the city this week, boast that they have emblazoned the motto 'Canada First' on their golden banners. They advise the common people to 'have no truck or trade with the Yankess'; and yet all the time they are buying American goods, importing American brains and investing in American securities, to the displacement of Canadian capital and labor. In so far as they engage in these things they are not traitors to their vaunted protective policy, which they would like to choke down the throats of their insignificant fellow countrymen?

Hon. J. D. Hazen has handed to The Standard a list of those who sent him telegrams and letters of congratulation on his appointment to the office of minister of marine and fisheries. The names of Hon. H. F. McLeod, O. S. Crockett and J. K. Pinder do not appear in the list, but we find those of A. R. Slipp, M.P.P., E. B. Hanson, John A. Humble, Dr. Phillip Cox, R. D. Wilmot and J. D. Black. The name of the minister's former law partner, Mr. John Black of Vancouver, B.C., also appears in the list.

Halifax Chronicle.—Cns of the first official acts of the virtuous Mr. Monk whom Mr. Bourassa forced into the Borden cabinet as minister of public works, was to issue an order holding up the dredging operations in St. John harbor, but as soon as the dredging plant was purchased by a syndicate of St. John Tories the order was rescinded, and the mud is now flying merrily. Great is Toryism!

Hon. Mr. Hazen was today returned unopposed to the House of Commons as member for St. John City and County. Hon. Mr. Hazen represented the same constituency at Ottawa from 1891 to 1896, when he was defeated in a three-cornered fight. St. John has been represented at Ottawa by a cabinet minister continuously since 1900.

Montreal Herald.—What Mr. Borden really thinks of the dreadful Yankee is shown by the utter complacency with which he runs over to Yankee land for a holiday before the House opens.

The Tory lawyers who acted for Mr. Smith in the recent proceedings in Sunbury and Queens appear to have made a mess of things. Mr. Smith has nothing for his trouble except experience.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, when he goes to Ottawa next month, should make it his business to find out why Hon. R. L. Borden ignored the Scotchmen and Presbyterians when forming his cabinet.

The Liberals of St. John have decided not to oppose the minister of marine and fisheries and he will be elected in St. John City and County by acclamation.

REFEREE ARRIVES.

Mr. E. McKay Forbes of Dalhousie University, arrived here from Halifax this morning, and is registered at the York Hotel. Mr. Forbes will referee today's Rugby match between Mt. Allison and the University of New Brunswick. He has played forward for Dalhousie and was appointed captain of that team, but is out of the game this season for personal reasons.

AMERICAN STOCKS HAD
DOWNWARD PLUNGE

New York, Oct. 27.—The long expected application to dissolve the U. S. Steel Corporation had a depressing effect on the stock market today. The common stock, under heavy selling pressure, dropped five points, and other issues went down in sympathy.

New York, Oct. 27.—There was a wild rush to sell United States Steel stock at the opening of the market today as a result of the government's dissolution suit. The common stock opened with a sale of 2,000 shares and fell to 53½, a loss of 5 points. The preferred stock fell to 105½.

The floor of the stock exchange was a scene of confusion. Long before trading was begun the brokers were jammed tightly about the post at which steel stocks are traded in.

ITALIANS HAD BIG LOSSES

As the Italian force advanced from the coast it was surprised at the absence of inhabitants. A search was made and the natives were discovered hidden in the grottoes where they had fled in fear of the aeroplanes scouting in advance of the soldiers.

Free distribution of large quantities of grain for sowing is the reward offered the Arabs for their assistance against the Turks. Any attempt at hostility or the concealment of arms by the natives will be inexorably punished.

ITALIANS ROUTED

Malta, Oct. 26.—The Italian reverses at Tripoli on October 23, according to steamship passengers who have just arrived here, amounted almost to a rout. An Italian outpost during a reconnaissance encountered a Turkish outpost which retreated, the Italians followed and found themselves suddenly attacked on all sides.

Three companies of Bersaglieri (light infantry) were totally annihilated, several officers were made prisoners and mutilated and hanged by irregulars.

tion's intention in this respect, but states that under the terms of the lease no cancellation would be effective until Jan. 1, 1915, and there is no limit upon the amount of ore that can be taken out in the mean time.

The Steel Corporation's acquisition of the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company during the panic of 1908 is declared illegal, and scathingly criticized. The petition declares that E. H. Gary and Henry C. Frick misled former President Roosevelt when they told him "That but little benefit will come to the Steel Corporation from the purchase."

FOOLED ROOSEVELT

"The president," it says, "was not made fully acquainted with the state of affairs in New York relevant to the transactions as they existed. If he had been fully advised he would have known that a desire to stop a panic was not the sole moving cause, but that there was also a desire and purpose to acquire the control of a company that had recently assumed a position of potential competition of great significance."

"By taking advantage of the embarrassment of Moore & Schley during the panic, the corporation, it is stated, greatly strengthened its control of ore supply and unlawfully acquired a power which is a menace to the welfare of the country and should be destroyed."

A large flock of wild geese was observed flying south over the city last night. Weather-wise persons say that the appearance of the geese is taken as a sign of a sudden drop in the temperature.

The return of the remainder of the Italian force, carrying a great number of wounded, said by some of the passengers to be seven hundred, caused intense excitement among the Arab population of Tripoli. The Arabs attempted to revolt, firing many shots and wounding many Italians. The attempt was soon quelled and hundreds of Mussulmans were arrested and shot. The passengers say that when they left Tripoli the town was still seething with excitement.
