## TO EXTEND C. P. R. STEAMSHIP SERVICE

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 26.—The business men's league traffic bureau has received the following communication from W. A. Porteous, agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway and steamship lines: As you are doubtless aware, the Canadian Pacific Railway has a direct line of steamers sailing from Montreal in the summer and from West St. John in the winter to Australian and New Zealand ports of call.

These have proven so successful that our vice-president is now considering the question of arranging a direct service from these ports to Calcutta, India and writes asking if there would be any prospects of business for some from this territory."

Mr. G. M. Bosworth, vice-president in charge of steamships today said: "It is true we are considering a service from Montreal to India but details are not yet available."

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 27.—With preliminary meetings this afternoon, followed by a great welcome demonstration in the Auditorium tonight, the thirty-eighth annual convention of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union got under way in Milwaukee today, and will continue its sessions until next Wednesday night. Sunday afternoon the annual sermon will be delivered by Mrs. Mary Kuhl of Illinois, and Sunday evening Mrs. Mary Harris Armer of Georgia will preach.

## WOMEN'S ILLS LAID TO ANTI-FAT DRUG

Society women who from time to time are reported as suffering from indigestion or as exhausted by the continuous round of social obligation and retire for a rest cure are not ill from these things at all. The Medical Journal announces, but have been using one or another of the insidious drugs intended to reduce their flesh and are afflicted with a form of dangerous poisoning.

Physicians who attend such persons the Publications asserts, are taunted in administering treatment because the patient as a rule, keeps from them the fact that the flesh reducing drug is being used, and therefore relief is next to impossible, because the man of medicine is unable to tell what influence he has to counteract to bring about a cure. In the meantime the patient, a prey to vanity, goes on suffering until disease has established itself permanently in the system.

Much of this trouble is attributed to the indiscriminate use of thyroid, a drug produced from the glands of the lower animals. The public, and particularly society women, who harbor obesity, is cautioned against the careless use of the drug, which is put up in patient medicine forms and is sold through the mails.

So serious has this situation become that it has been taken up by the American Association, which unsparringly denounces the use of the drug, excepting in cases where it is taken according to the prescription of a physician. The attention of the association was directed to the facts by a recent newspaper article in which it was declared that society women of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Newport and Narraansett, who recently were reported ill because of their social activities, were, in fact, victims of thyroid poisoning, the drug being taken in some form to keep down the accumulation of flesh which follows a round of feasting.

Referring to this drug, the journal of the association says:—"Like most effective drugs it has its dangerous side. A few years ago when Germany placed strict restrictions on the sale of thyroid it was for a time a subject of much discussion. It was accelerated by the fact that some of the first ladies of that country had had an experience similar to that reported from Newport."

"Thyroid is stated to be used more extensively as an anti-fat than for any other purpose. It is used as such and, as some of the Washington officials have found, as an ingredient of many patent medicines. It would be well for physicians to make inquiries on this subject when consulted by obese patients complaining of sleeplessness, nervousness, palpitation, gastric disturbances, etc. Patients are not very likely to volunteer the information that they have been taking thyroid and still less that they have been patronizing some mail order house."

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 27.—From the moment when President Taft arrives in Chicago tonight until his departure from the city next Monday afternoon every minute is to be turned to account. His public appearances and his public addresses will be more numerous than in any other city visited on his present transcontinental trip. Among the important ceremonies, conventions and social functions in which he will participate will be meetings of the American Mining Congress and the Chicago Bar Association, the dedication of the new naval training station at North Chicago, the annual dinner of the Chicago Association of Commerce, and the laying of the corner stone of the new Hamilton Club Building. In addition to delivering speeches more or less brief at each of these functions the President is scheduled for addresses at the Chicago Sunday Evening Club and at the luncheon to be given in his honor by the Hamilton Club.
