CAUSE OF THE GREAT  
POLITICAL TURNOVER

The following communications expressing opinions on the recent political turnover appeared in a recent number of the Montreal Witness:

(To the Editor of the Witness)  
Sir,—Neither the Liberal Government nor reciprocity was defeated—it was annexation. The people were asked if they wanted reciprocity; they answered, we do not want annexation. One sad feature then is, no matter how clear-cut the issue may be which is submitted to the people one knows not what the answer will be. Another sad feature is the pretensions put forward by the victors, including the leader, that this is a victory for the people. Especially is this sad when one knows from the previous utterances and writings of the leading parliamentary opponents of the measure that they themselves were heart wholly in accord therewith, but opposed to it simply because it was a Liberal measure.

Sir,—I belong to the relatively small group of Canadians who think it was not a bad thing for the country to have a new administration, but who is sorry that the government should fall on the issue of reciprocity. They have missed their opportunity. They have bartered sound logic in the matter of trade policy for a mawkish sentiment. I believe the common people will yet clamor for what they have now by their votes ruthlessly spurned.

Sir,—Having devoted four or five weeks to campaigning activity in several Ontario constituencies during the recent Dominion elections, permit me to state one or two causes which I know contributed mainly to the defeat of the Laurier administration in this province, viz.,

1. The reciprocity agreement was misunderstood and misrepresented to the people. The Opposition speakers appeared to national prejudice and succeeded in arousing intense antipathy to Canadians having 'truck or trade' with the cutes Yankee. President Taft and Champ Clark, the Democratic congressional leader, were vehemently denounced as marplots intruding to abduct and seduce Canada from the British Empire.

Everywhere in rural communities suspicion, dread, jealousy, mistrust and contempt of our American neighbors were instilled into the minds of the electors. It was declared that the 'home market' would become a dumping ground for United States products, that cheap labor, niggers and foreign trash, I heard one speaker say, would swarm across the border and drive our Canadian workmen, that wages would be reduced both in the factories and on the farms, and that the cost of living would be increased as soon as reciprocity came into force.

2. I found the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as an illustrious son of the Catholic Church, had walked in the great Eucharistic procession in the city of Montreal last year was used against him with deadly effect.

In the Townships where Orange sentiment was supposed to be strong Conservative canvassers went round among the people whispering that Laurier was 'a Papist traitor,' plotting to hand Canada over to the Pope in chains. The 'ne temere' decree about which there has been much honest indignation expressed in all the Protestant churches, was also shamelessly used to the damage of the Liberal candidates. This decree was represented as a wicked and insidious attempt by the Roman hierarchy to destroy the sanctity of the marriage tie in the case of Protestants who married Catholics and it was pretended that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was aiding and abetting this odious crime. I have encountered married women who were on the warpath in this election, actually working against the Liberals on this malignant ground. I am sure Sir Wilfrid never dreamed that such poisoned weapons would be used against him.

BILLY McLEAN MAY  
JOIN BORDEN CABINET

(Toronto News)  
Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The work of cabinet work proceeds slowly. There is no doubt that Mr. Borden has determined upon most of his colleagues. There are still, however, some final decisions to be made and some claims to be considered. Mr. Borden has been overwhelmed with deputations and has given to all representations careful and sympathetic consideration, while in every case reserving his own final judgment.

It is certain that Mr. W. T. White of Toronto could have the portfolio of Finance, but it is exceedingly doubtful if he could be persuaded to devote himself to a political career. It may be regarded as certain that the Cabinet will include, Hon. Frank Cochrane, probably as Minister of Public Works, Mr. A. E. Kemp of East Toronto, Dr. Reid of Grenville, Mr. Thos. Crothers of West Elgin, or W. S. Middleboro of North Grey. Mr. Foster probably will have his choice of entering the cabinet or the Chairmanship of the tariff commission which the new government will create. There is also a formidable movement in favor of Mr. W. F. Maclean, of South York, as Minister of Agriculture, and the more his fitness for the office is considered, combined with his admitted political sagacity and his capacity on the platform, the stronger the case in his behalf becomes.

## MR. OSLER'S POSITION

It is definitely understood that Mr. Osler does not desire any appointment and is even unwilling to consider the office of High Commissioner from Quebec. It is expected that Mr. Doherty of St. Anns, Mr. Forger of Charlevoix, and Mr. Pelletier in Quebec County will have seats in the government. The fate of Mr. Monk will depend entirely upon his attitude toward the navy. Mr. O. S. Crockett of York is almost certain to be the Minister from New Brunswick, while there is now serious talk of Mr. Hector McInnes, a brilliant lawyer of Halifax and perhaps the most influential and eminent of Nova Scotia Conservatives, as Minister of Justice from the West Hon. Robert Rogers certainly will have a place in the cabinet with Mr. Roche or Mr. McEwen as his colleague. It is also believed that there is a disposition to find a seat for Mr. C. A. McGrath, who was defeated in Medicine Hat, but who is held in very great personal regard in the west and unquestionably would bring strength to the new Administration. Mr. McBride of British Columbia has given a definite decision against entering the government and probably Mr. Good-ave of Kootenay will be the Minister from the Pacific Provinces.

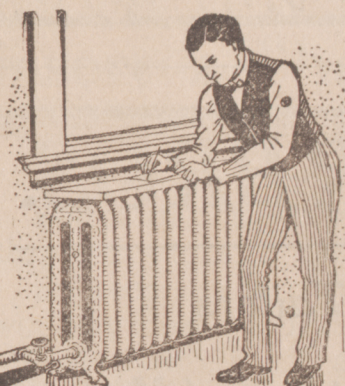

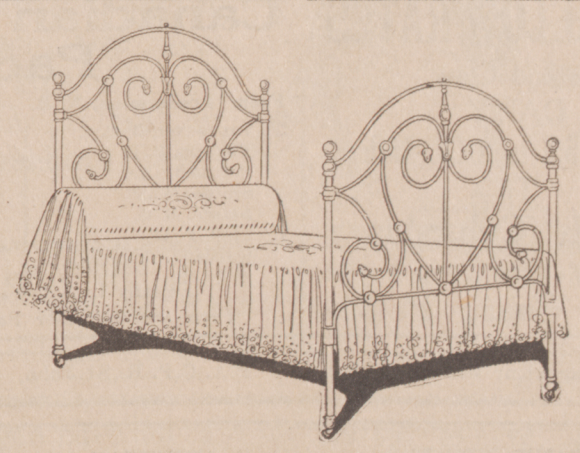
