**THREE-YEAR-OLDS
RACED GREAT MILE
AT LEXINGTON**

Race Postponed after Third Heat--Hal B. Jr. Won 2.06 Pace in Handy Fashion

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 3.—Sunset tonight made necessary a halt in one of the greatest colt races that the turf has ever known. Battling over a track slow and tiring, the flower of America's 3-year-old trotters cracked out miles faster than 2.09, and when darkness caused a postponement, Mainleaf, the pride of the Blue Grass country, had two seats to his credit and the New York colt, Atlantic Express, one while the favorite, Peter Thompson, had fallen only a head short in each of the three nerve racking finishes.

The start of this, the 19th renewal of the famous Kentucky Futurity, was witnessed by a large crowd even for Futurity Day, and this in spite of the fact that it was past noon before there looked to be a chance that the colts would have a track dry enough to race over.

With disappearance of the clouds a stiff breeze came up, and late in the afternoon the footing was declared safe enough to race over.

It was a great disappointment that the race could not have been started over a fast track, as the opening mile in 2.08½ was surely equal to 2.06 under perfect conditions.

The Tennessee was won in straight heats of the favorite, Hal B. Jr., who was on his good behavior. The second heat in 2.03½ was an effort that slowed the next mile up to 2.08½.

The hope is for a fast track tomorrow, when Uhlan will make an effort to beat 1.58½ to sulky. The champion was given a couple of slow blowing out miles today and was pronounced in top form by his trainer, Charley Tanner. The summary:

**YOUNG SAYLOR
CHECKED NELSON
COME-BACK SCHEME**

Old Battler Beaten by Indianapolis Man in Twelve-round Bout at Boston Armory

Boston, Oct. 4.—Young Saylor, the young Indianapolis lightweight, interrupted an interruption into Battling Nelson's come-back campaign last night by getting the decision over the old battler in their twelve-round bout at the Armory A. A. In getting the verdict Saylor gave Nelson one of the worst whalings he has received for a long time, but at that Nelson was able to go a longer journey if necessary. Saylor was an enigma to Nelson and the Indianapolis lad beat him from the first tap of the gong to the end at his own style of boxing.

NELSON THE SAME.

Nelson was the same rushing-in, confident boxer he always has been, but when he got to close quarters he invariably ran against a snag, for Saylor was there with the tie-up and blocking tactics, which Nelson found it hard to overcome.

Only once did the Battler resort to any of the inside work that is not according to the rules. Saylor showed him that he was also good at that game, and Nelson did not try it again. In one of the early sessions the Battler started to use his head like a billy-goat. Saylor came back at him with some butting of his own and showed the Battler a new one.

Saylor stepped in quickly and, putting the heel of his glove under the Battler's chin, he nearly sent Nelson's head off his shoulders. After that everything went along peacefully, neither boxer attempting to violate the rules.

NELSON STILL UNCONVINCED.

Saylor showed that Nelson cannot come back. The Battler is not convinced of that fact, although he acknowledged after the contest that Saylor is not only a good boxer, but that he was entitled to the decision.

While Saylor was happy over winning from Nelson, Tommy Murphy of New York, who seconded Saylor, felt just as elated. He and Nelson are bitter enemies, and he came to Boston especially to challenge Nelson. The New Yorker was engaged by Saylor to coach him during the battle, and Murphy did his work well.

BATTLER HAD ADVANTAGE.

Saylor had to weight in at 133 lbs. at three o'clock in the afternoon, while Nelson came in at catchweights. That gave Nelson some advantage in weight but it did not help him to any extent. They had agreed to box on the plan to protect themselves at all times and to keep boxing all the time. After a number of rounds, during which there had been considerable clinching, the referee changed the plan and broke them apart when they got into a clinch.

Nelson was a topheavy favorite going into the ring, for Saylor had never been seen by any of the local fans; but the bout had gone only a few sessions when there was some switching, for it appeared then that the Battler had again met his master. Saylor is certainly a cool proposition, and he handled the old-timer as he would a less experienced boxer.

CLEVER BOXER.

He is clever in many ways, besides having a good punch and a great variety of them. He displayed one that was new, not only to the Battler, but also to the fans, and the old ex-king could not figure out a way to stop Saylor from getting it on the kidneys and stomach. At infighting, which is Nelson's favorite style of milling, Saylor had him puzzled, for he blocked and tied him up so well that Nelson could not land many telling blows on Saylor's body.

Miss De Forest, 2.07½ has won five pacing Futurities to date.
